## 2021 National Defense Survey *Executive Summary*

# About the Survey

<b>Mode</b>	Combined telephone (n=998) and online panel (n=1525) survey. Telephone interviews conducted by trained professionals calling landlines (49%) and cellphones (51%).
<b>Sample</b>	2,523 U.S. Adults.
<b>Dates</b>	October 25 – November 7, 2021.
<b>Weights</b>	Slight weights were applied to ensure the sample accurately reflects the demographic profile of the U.S. population.
<b>Margin of Error</b>	$\pm 2\%$ at the 95% confidence level for the entire sample. Most questions were split sampled (n $\approx$ 1250, $\pm 2.8\%$ ). The margin of error for subgroups is higher.

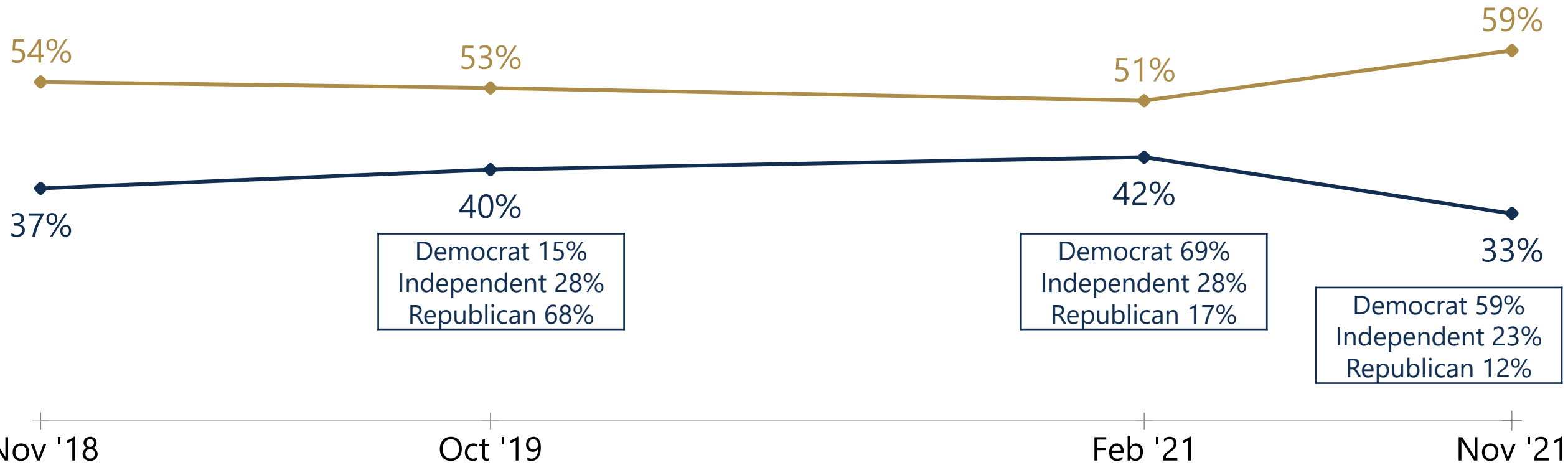

◆ Right Direction    ◆ Wrong Track

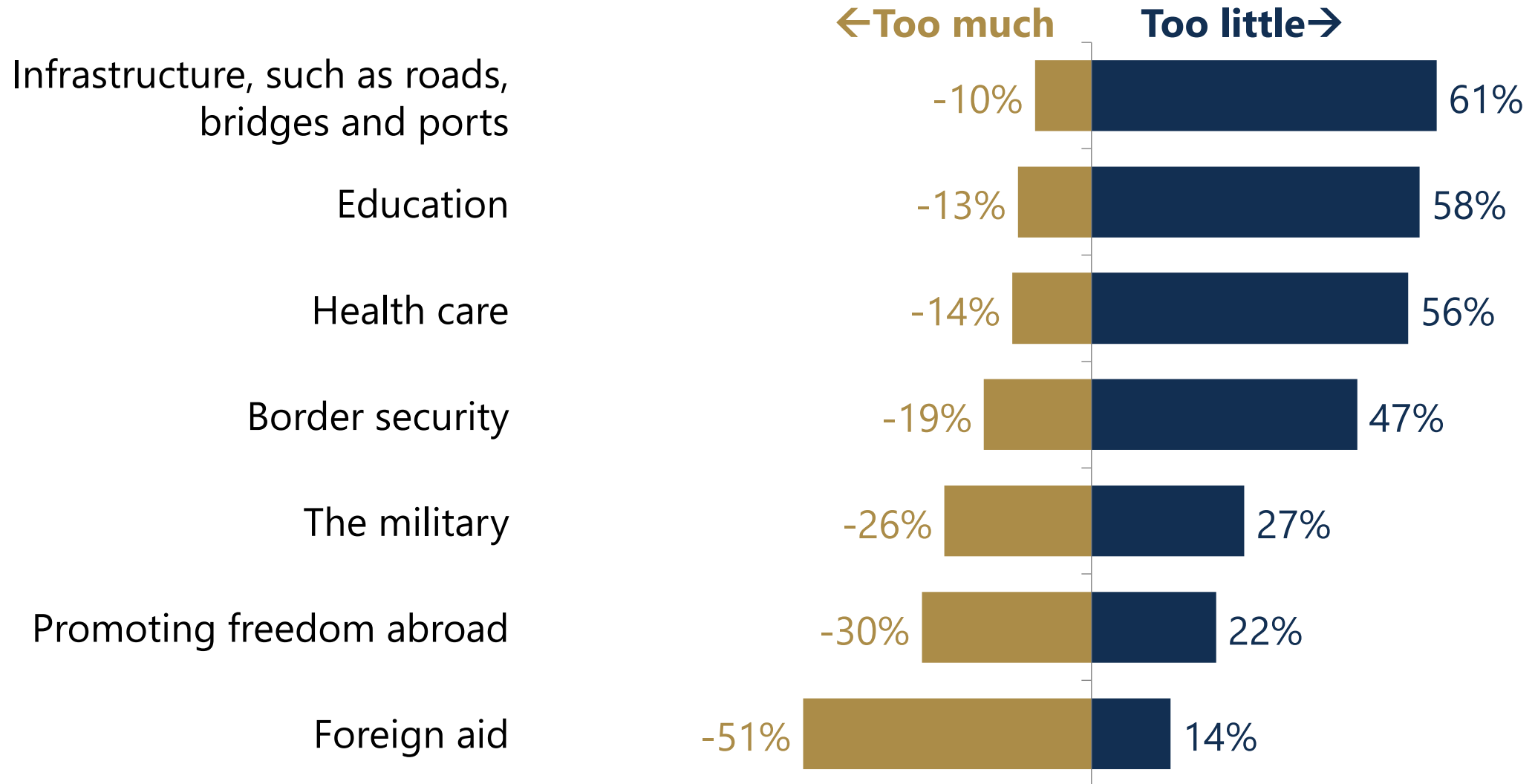

# On balance, support for increased spending on infrastructure, education, healthcare, and border security.

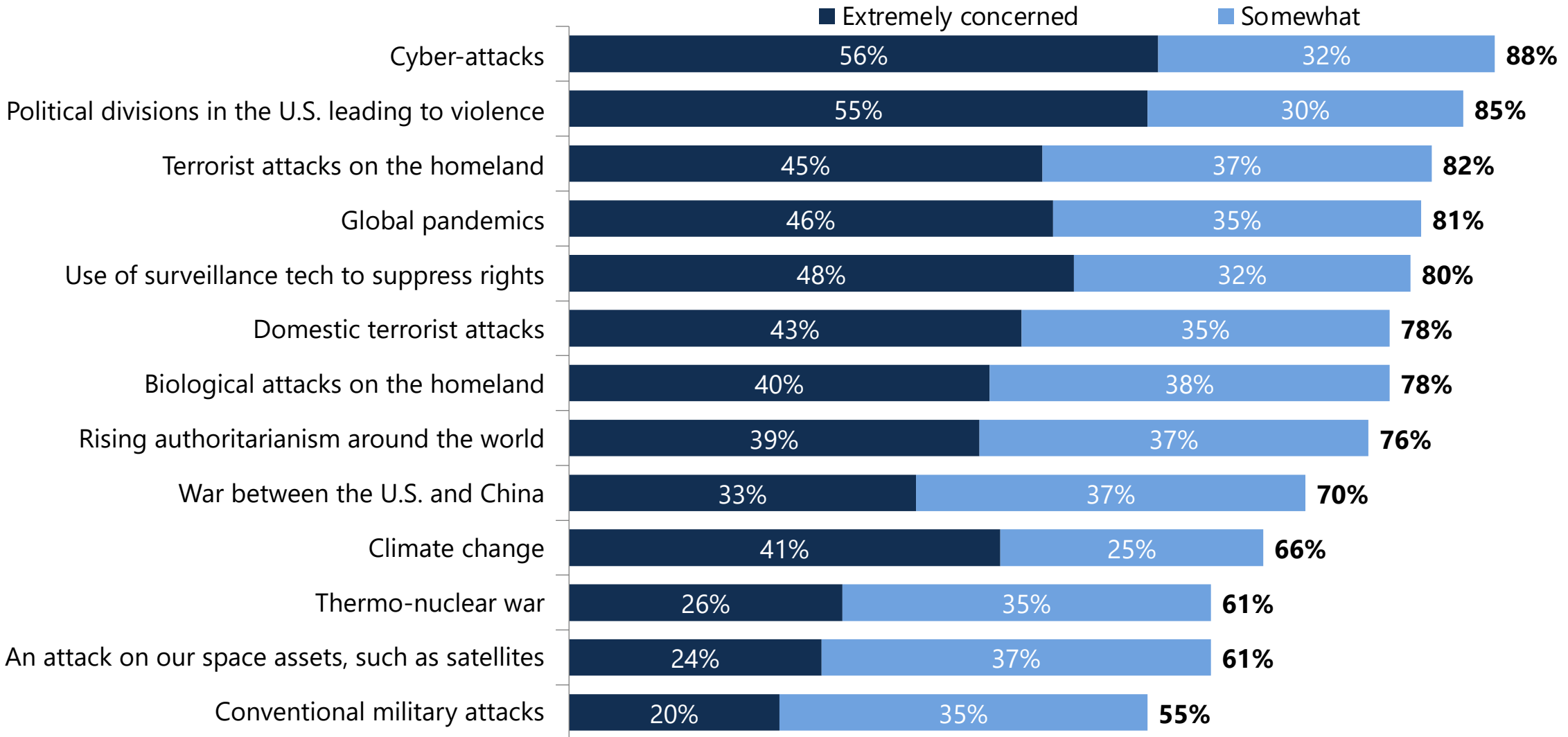

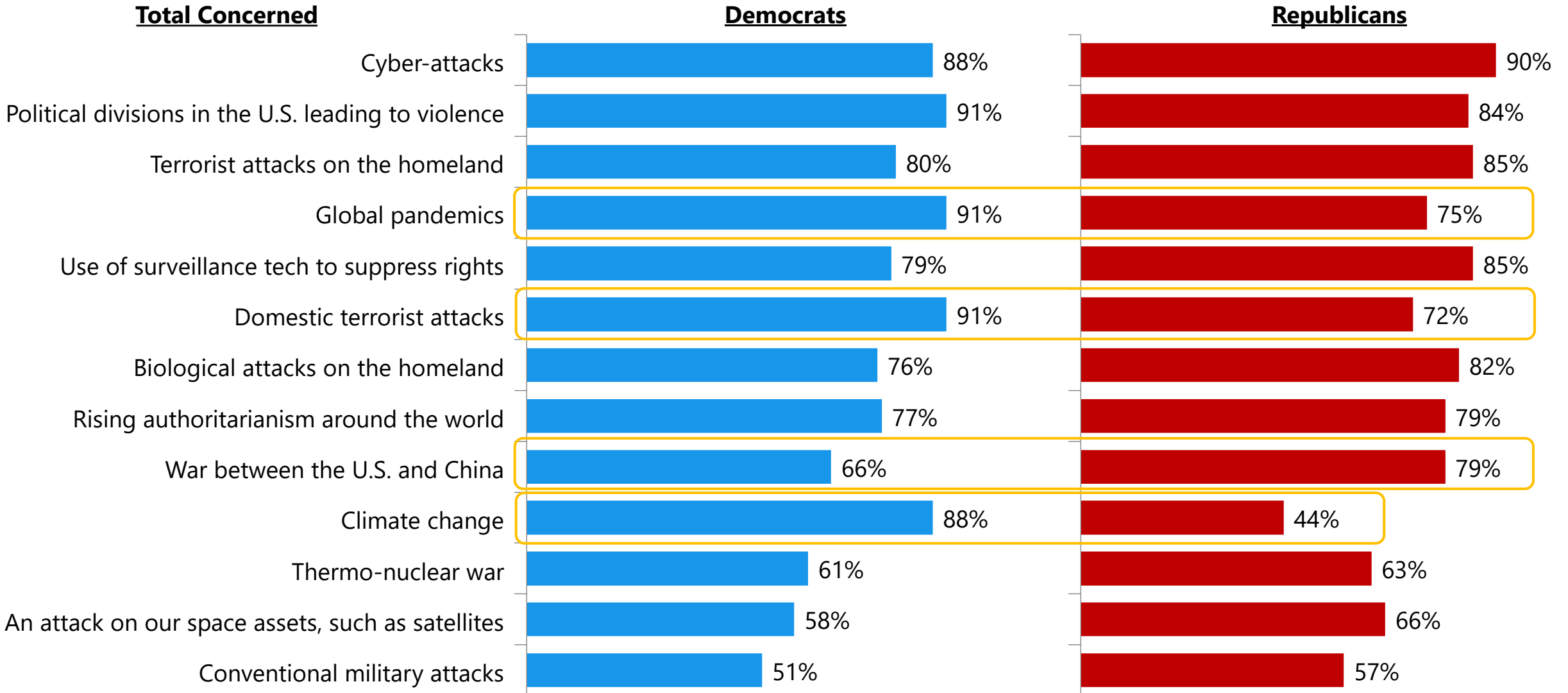

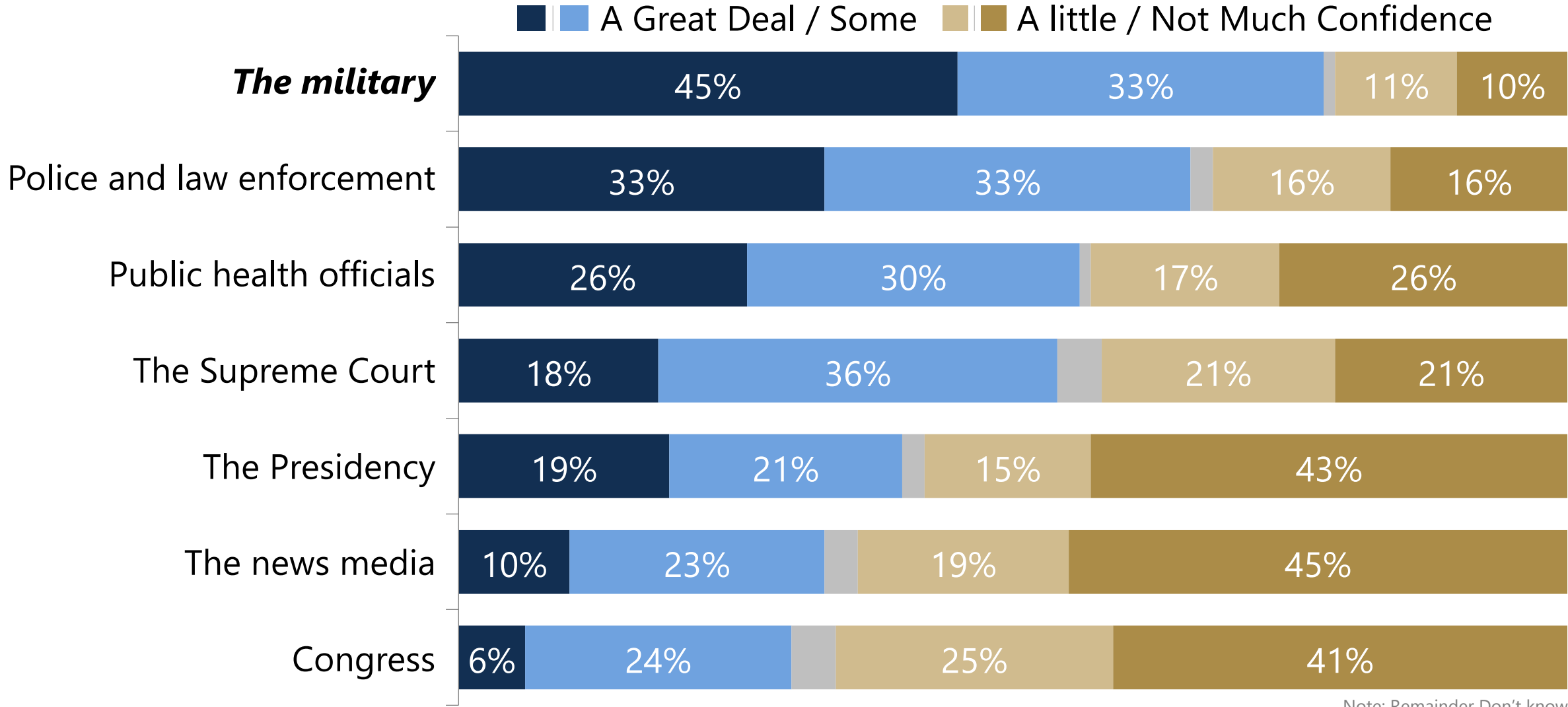

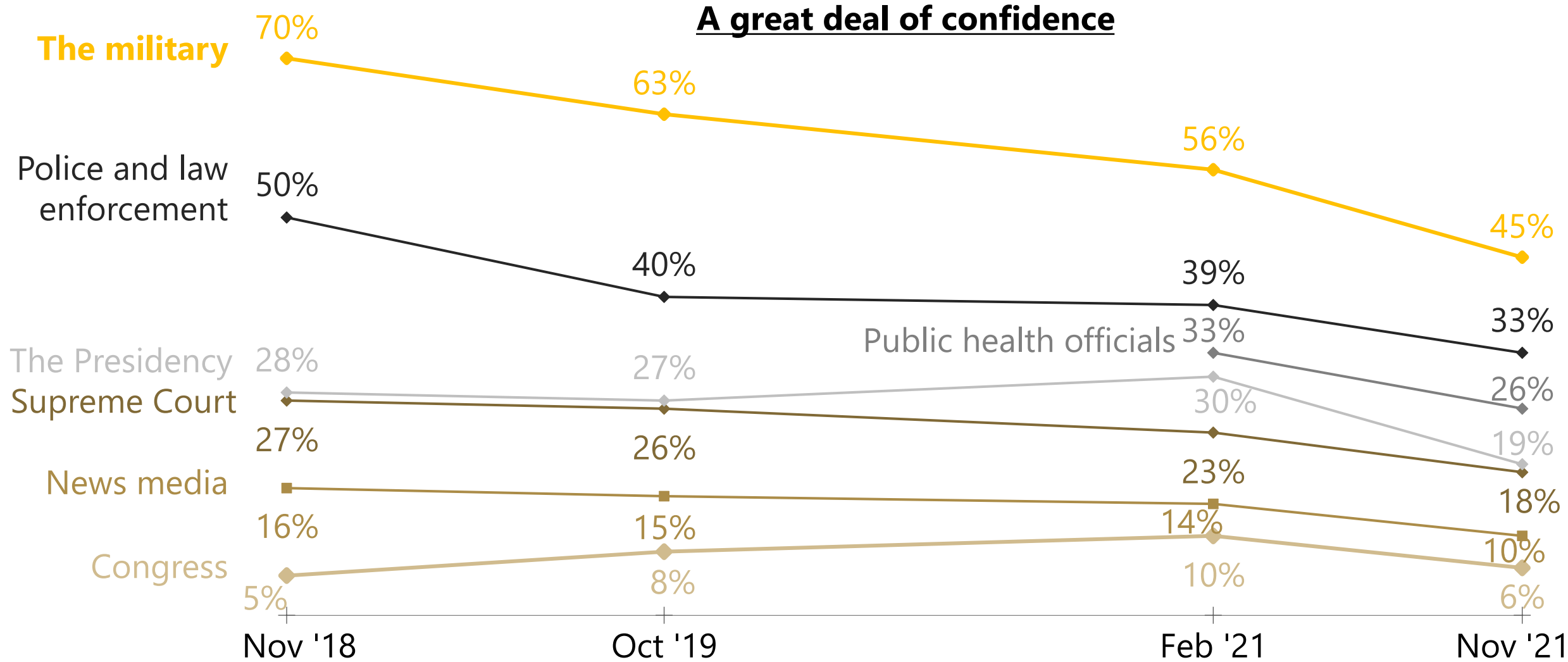

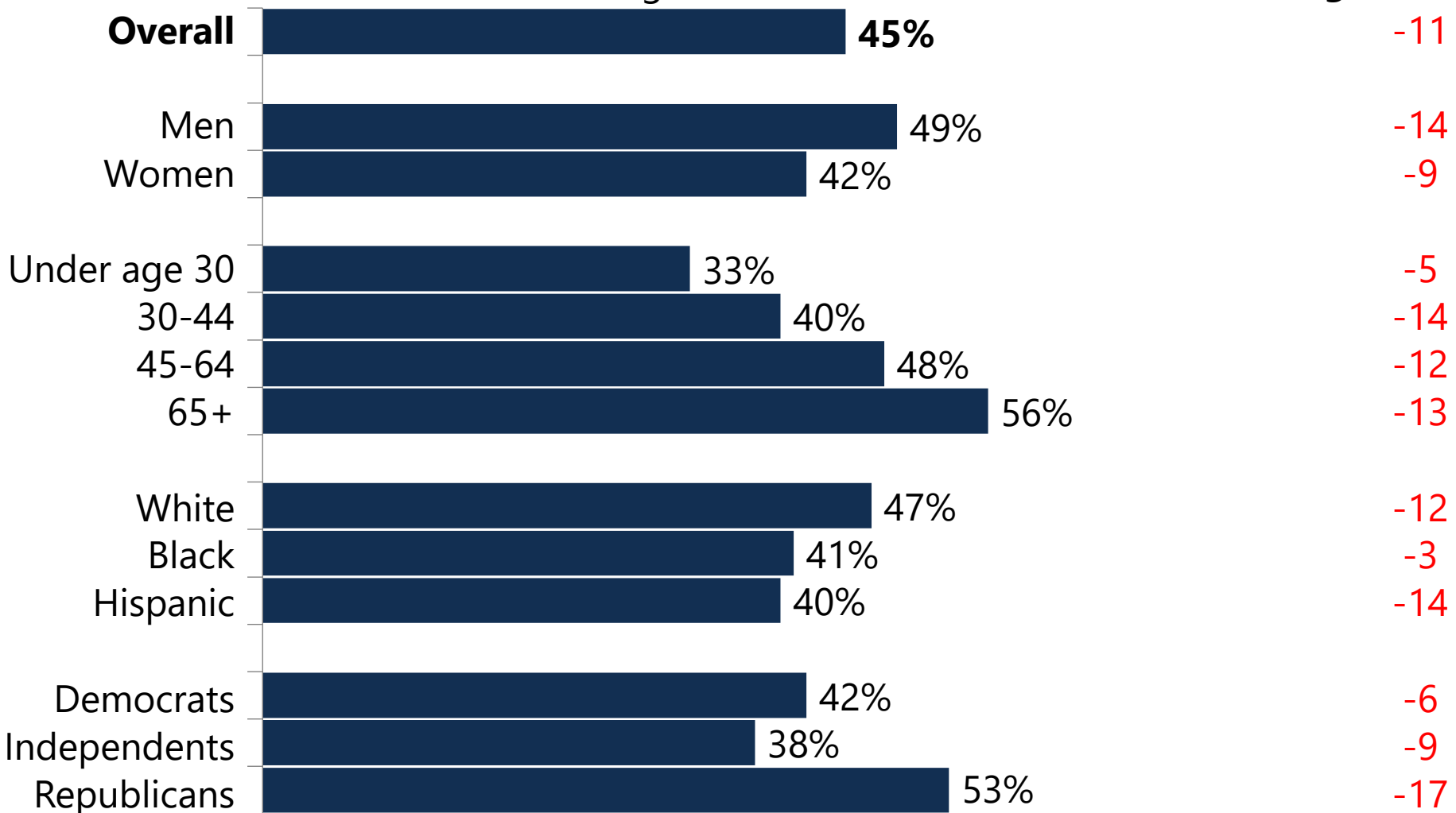

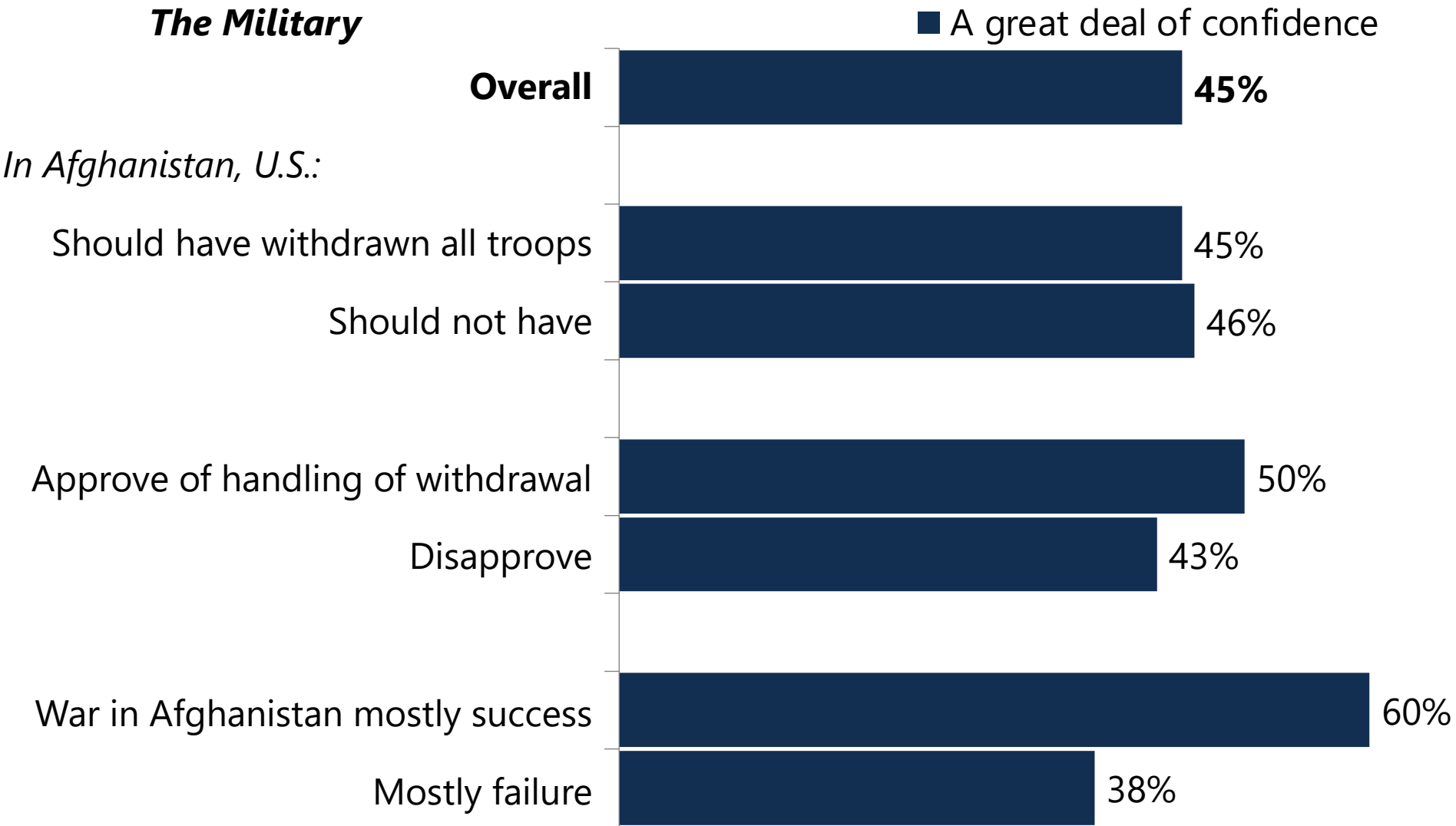

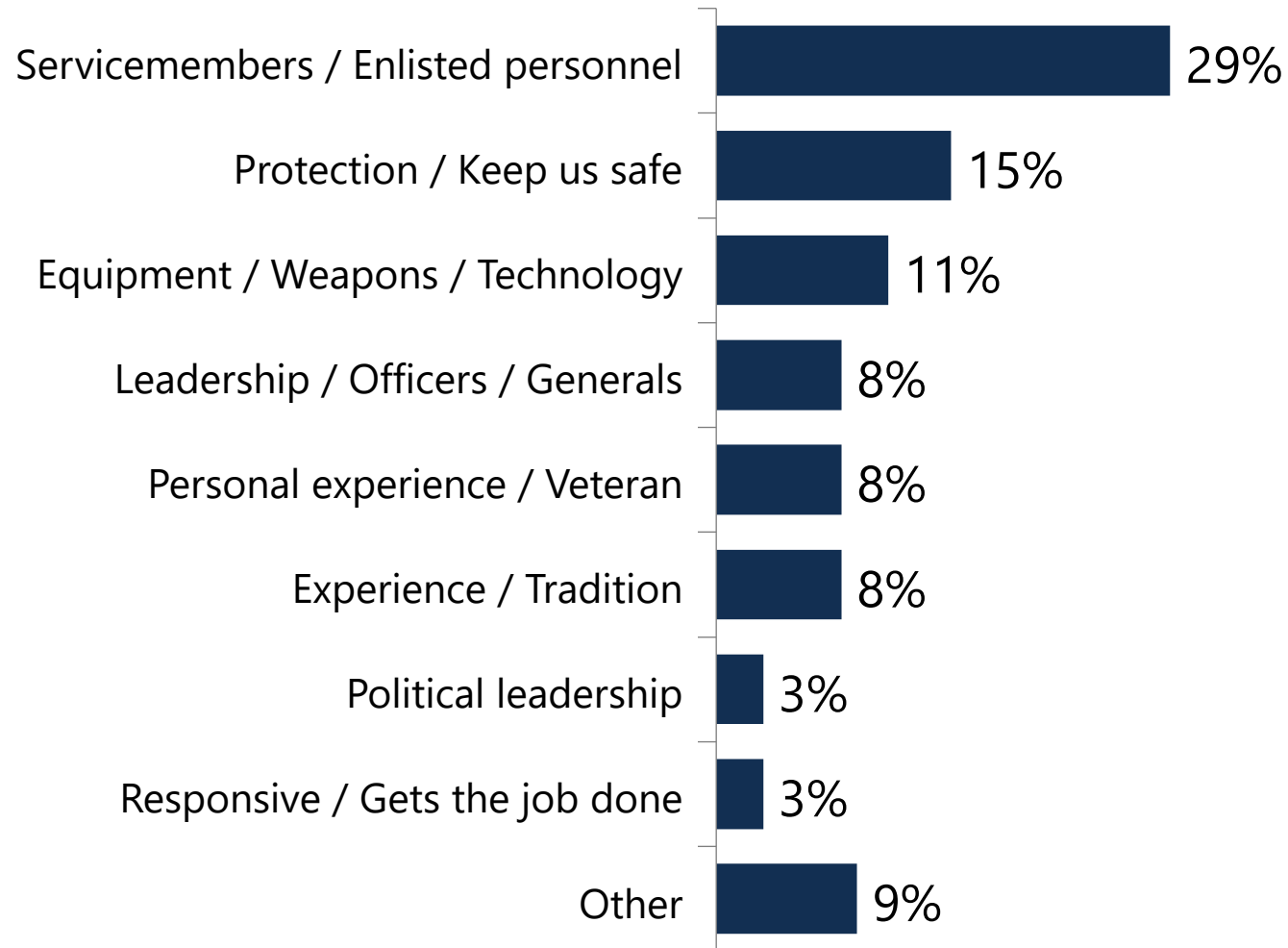

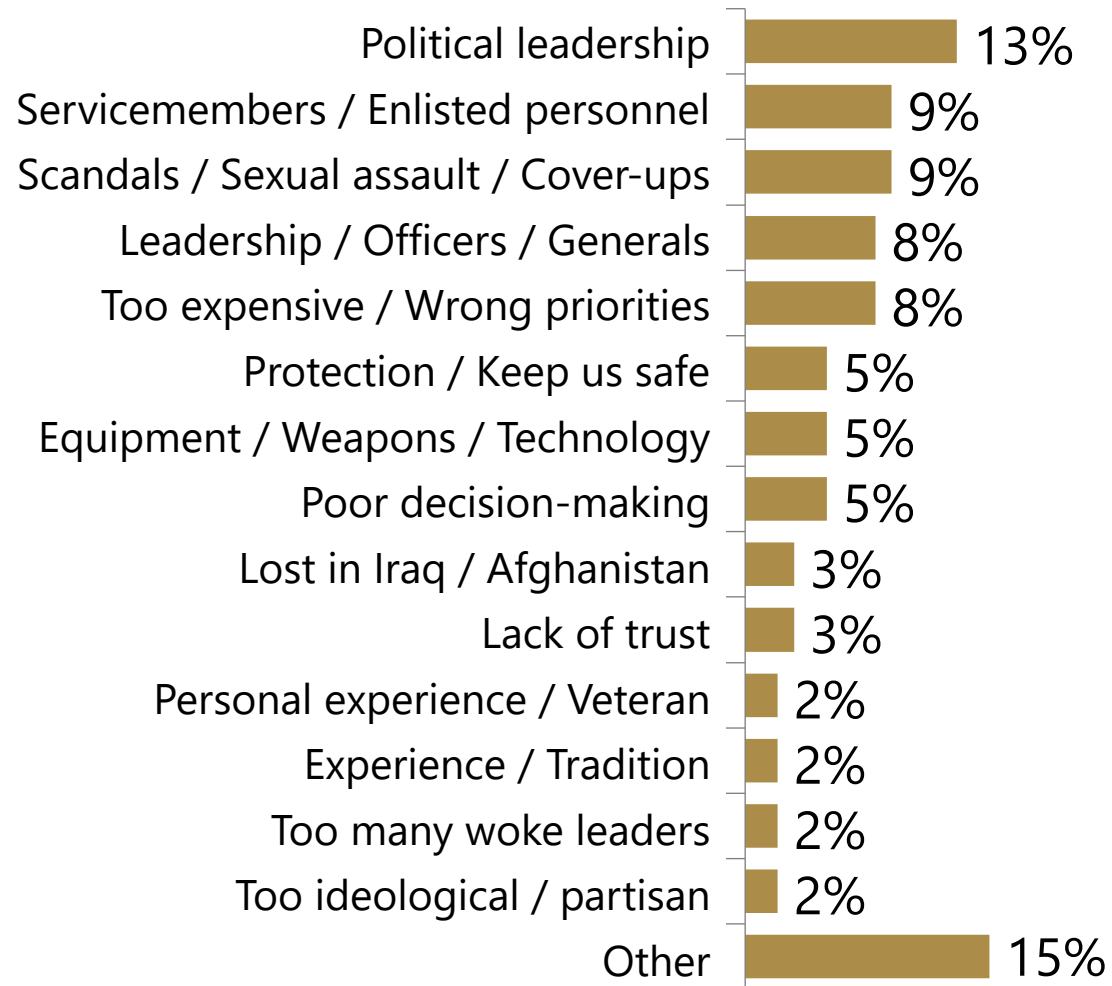

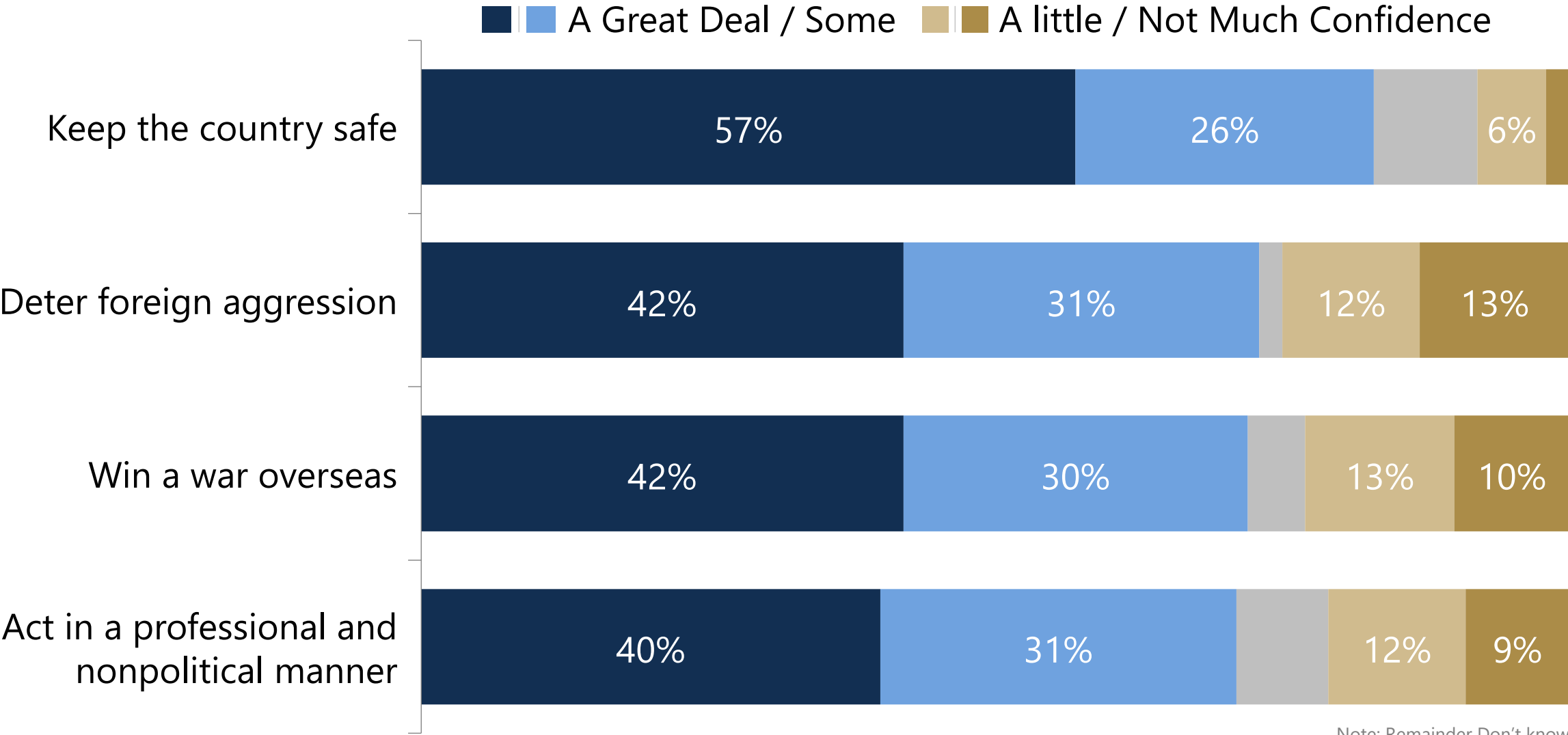

# Higher degree of confidence in military's ability to keep country safe.

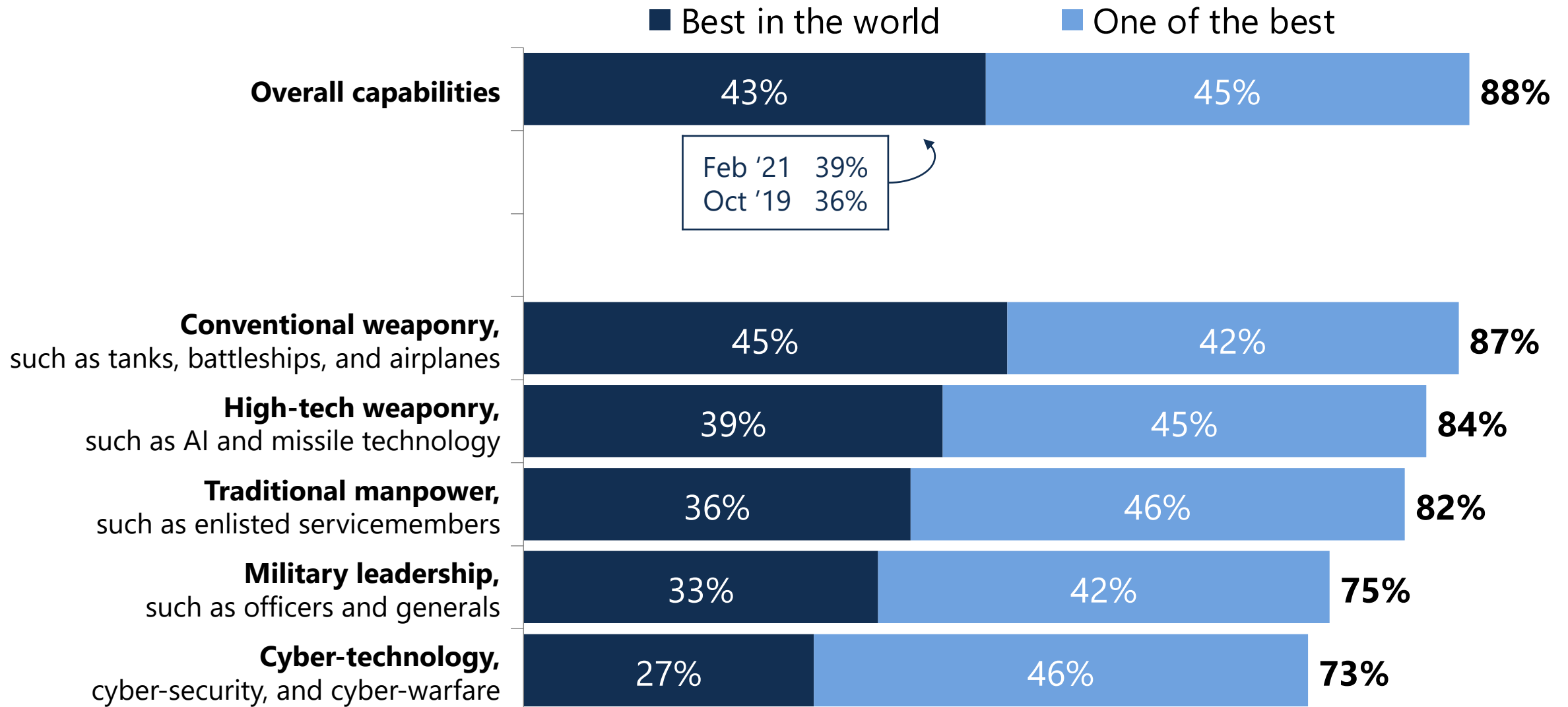

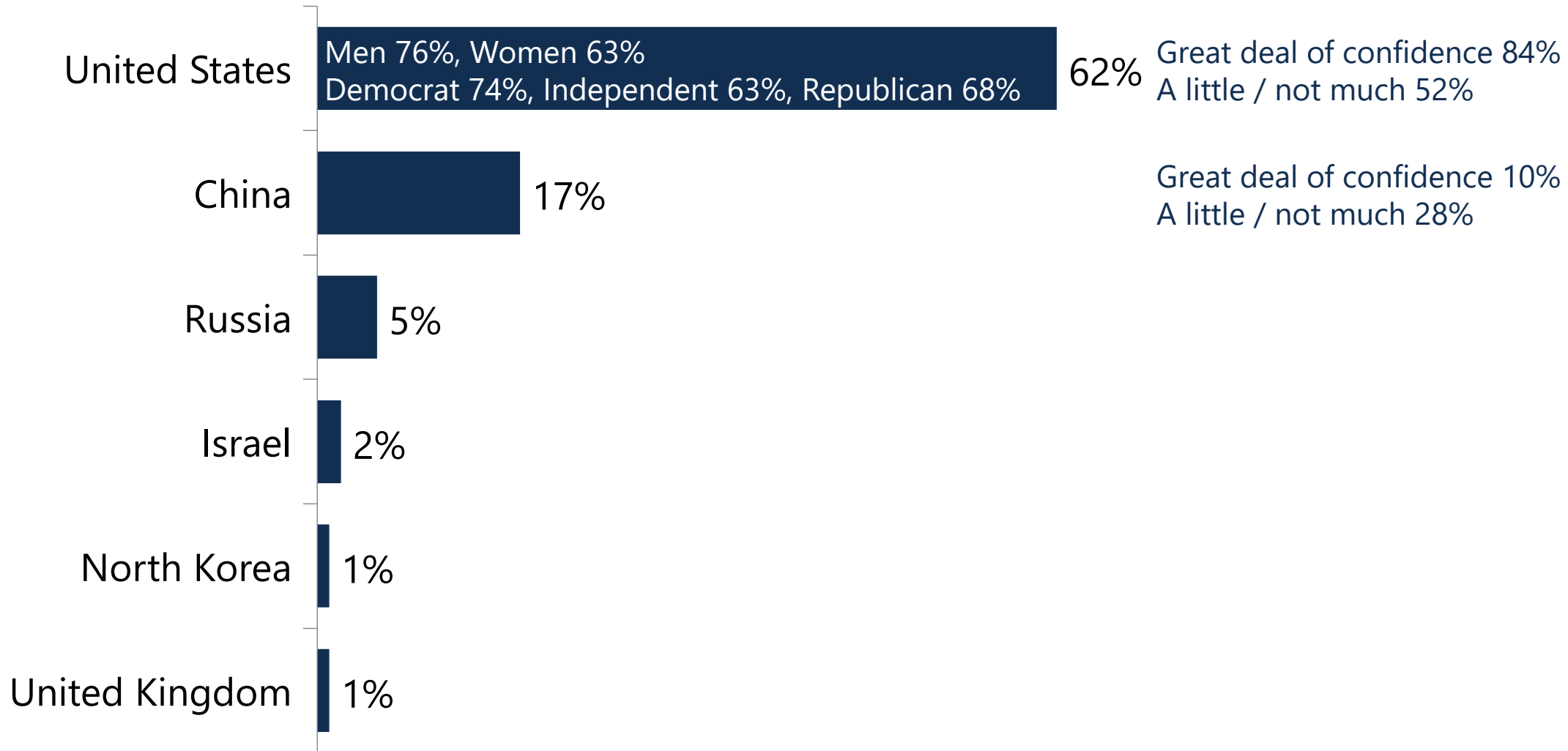

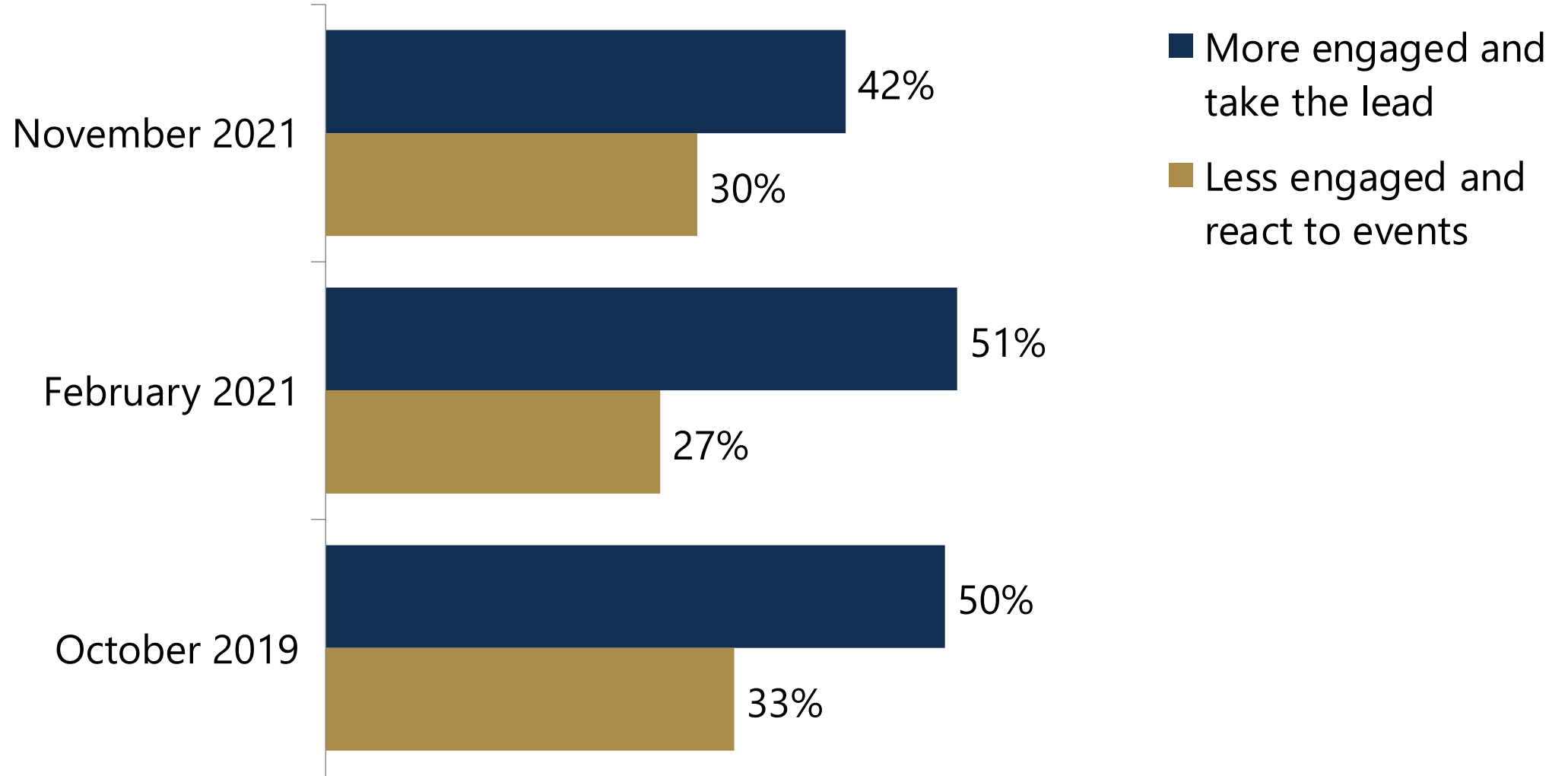

# Decrease in support for an engaged U.S. foreign policy.

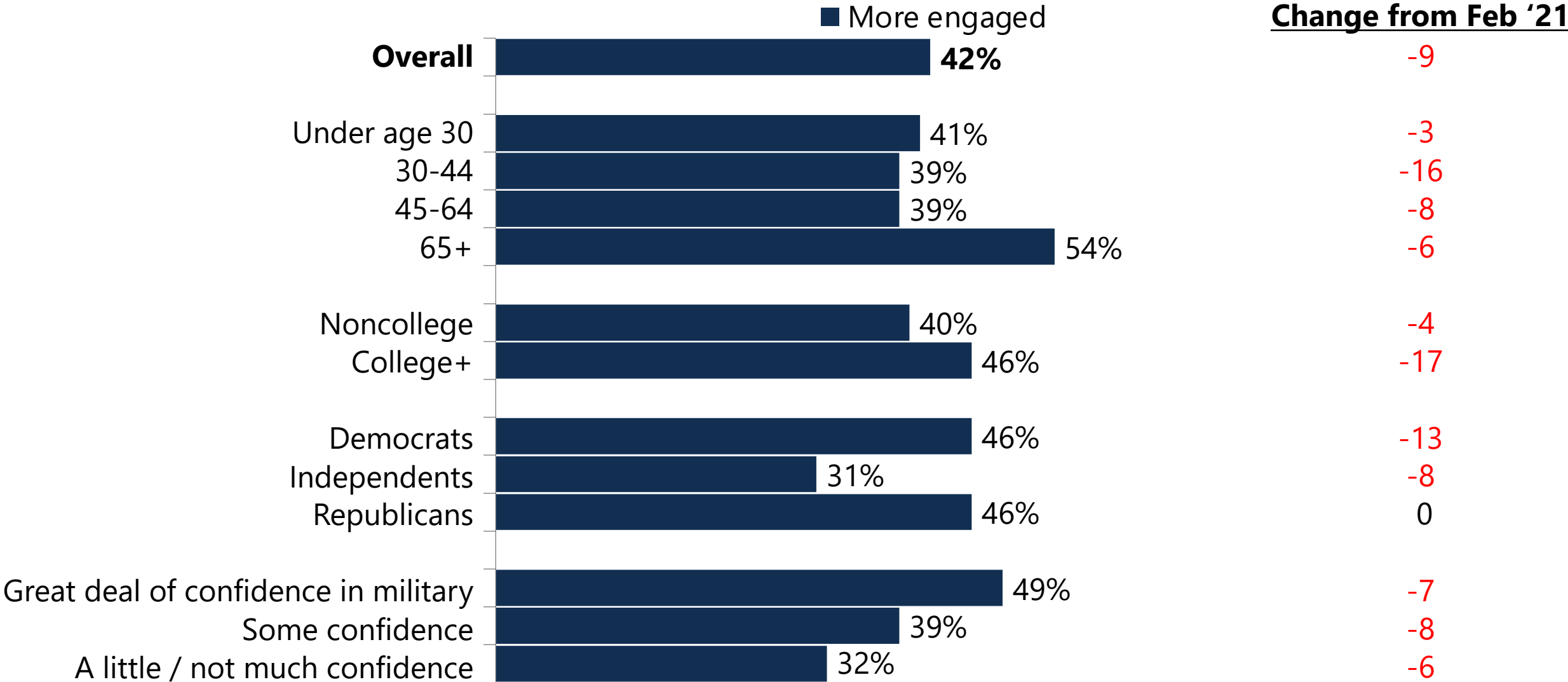

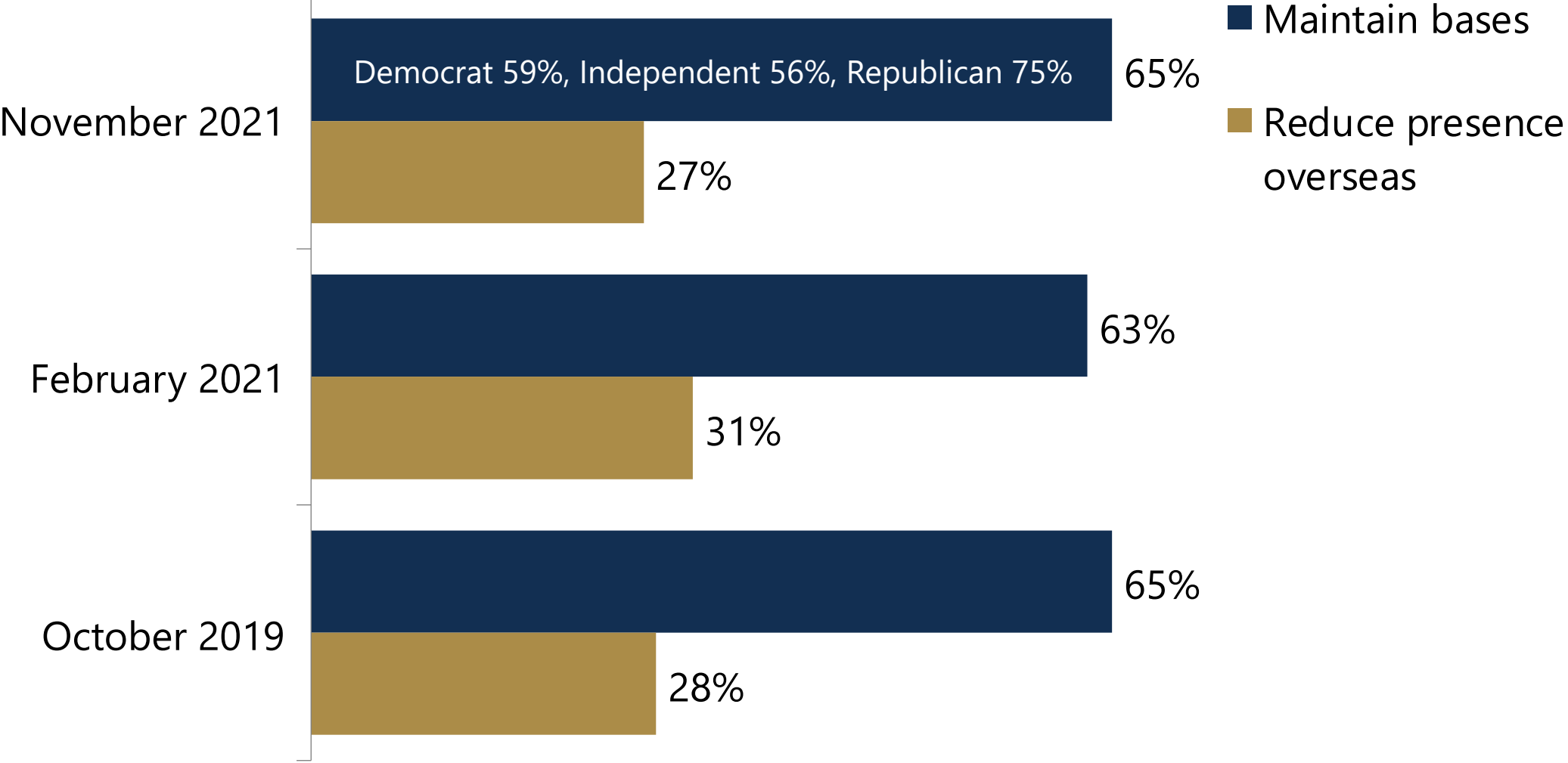
# Change in support for engaged foreign policy, by subgroup

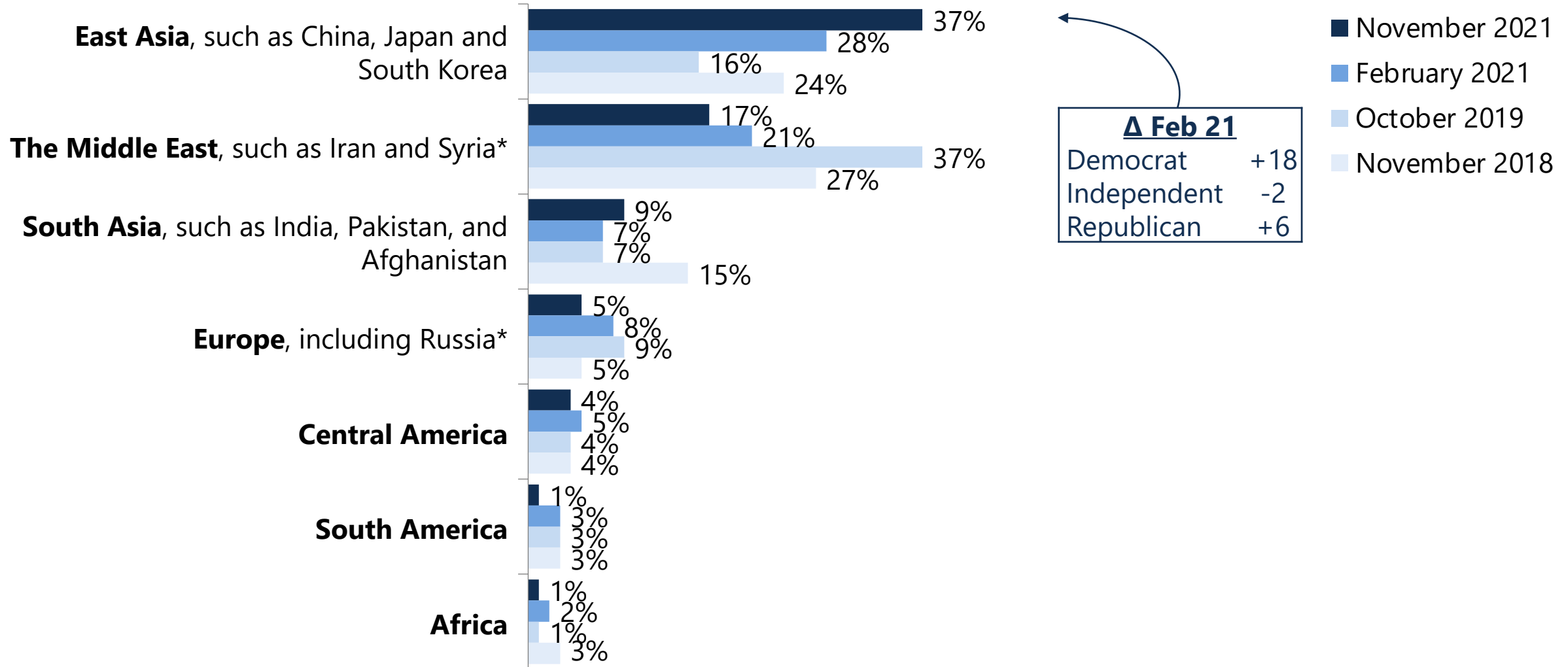

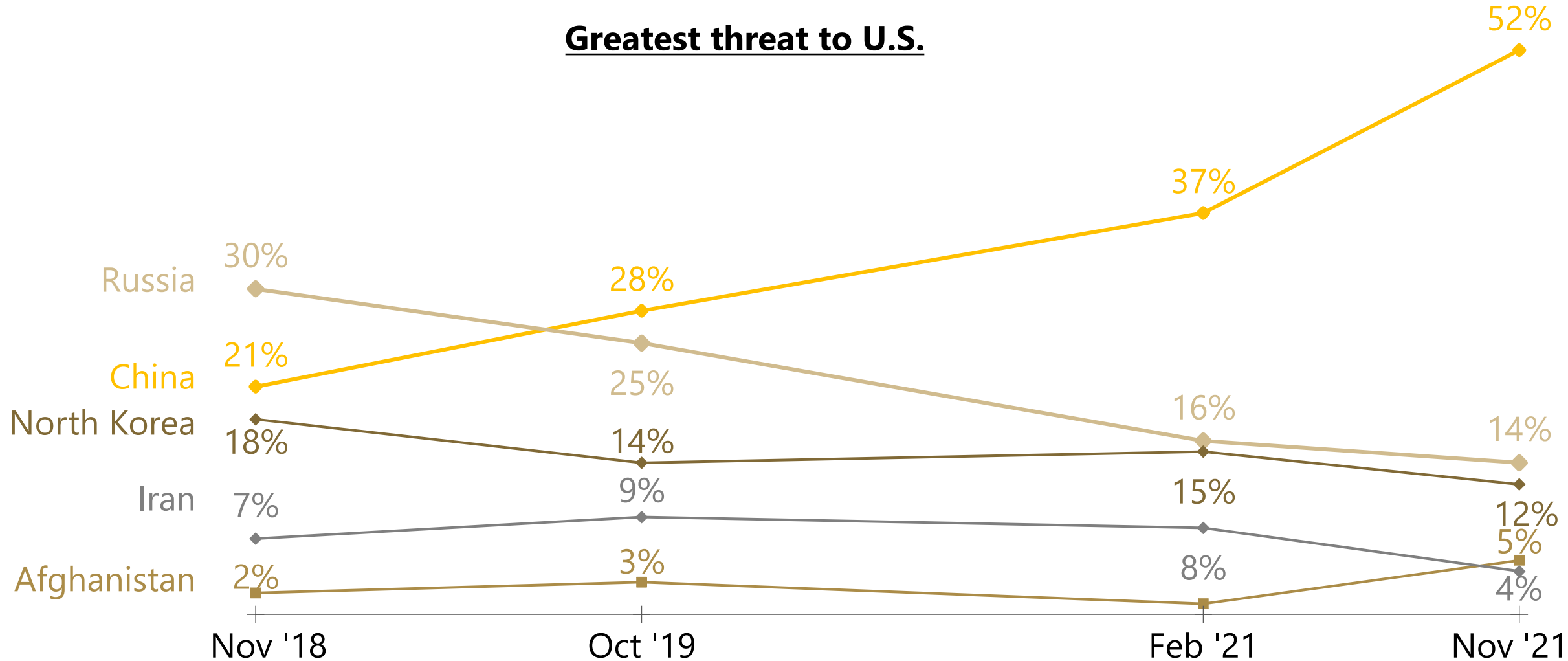

## Greatest threat to U.S.

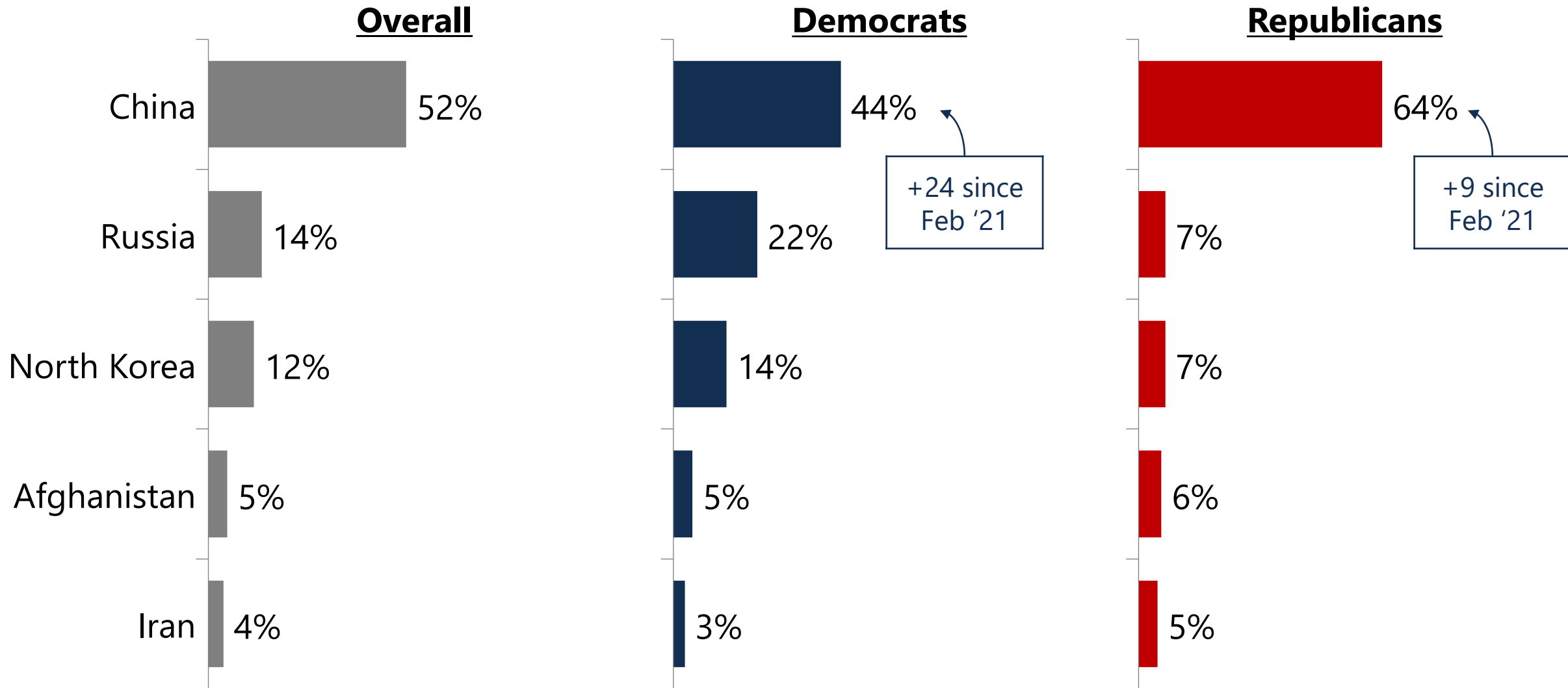

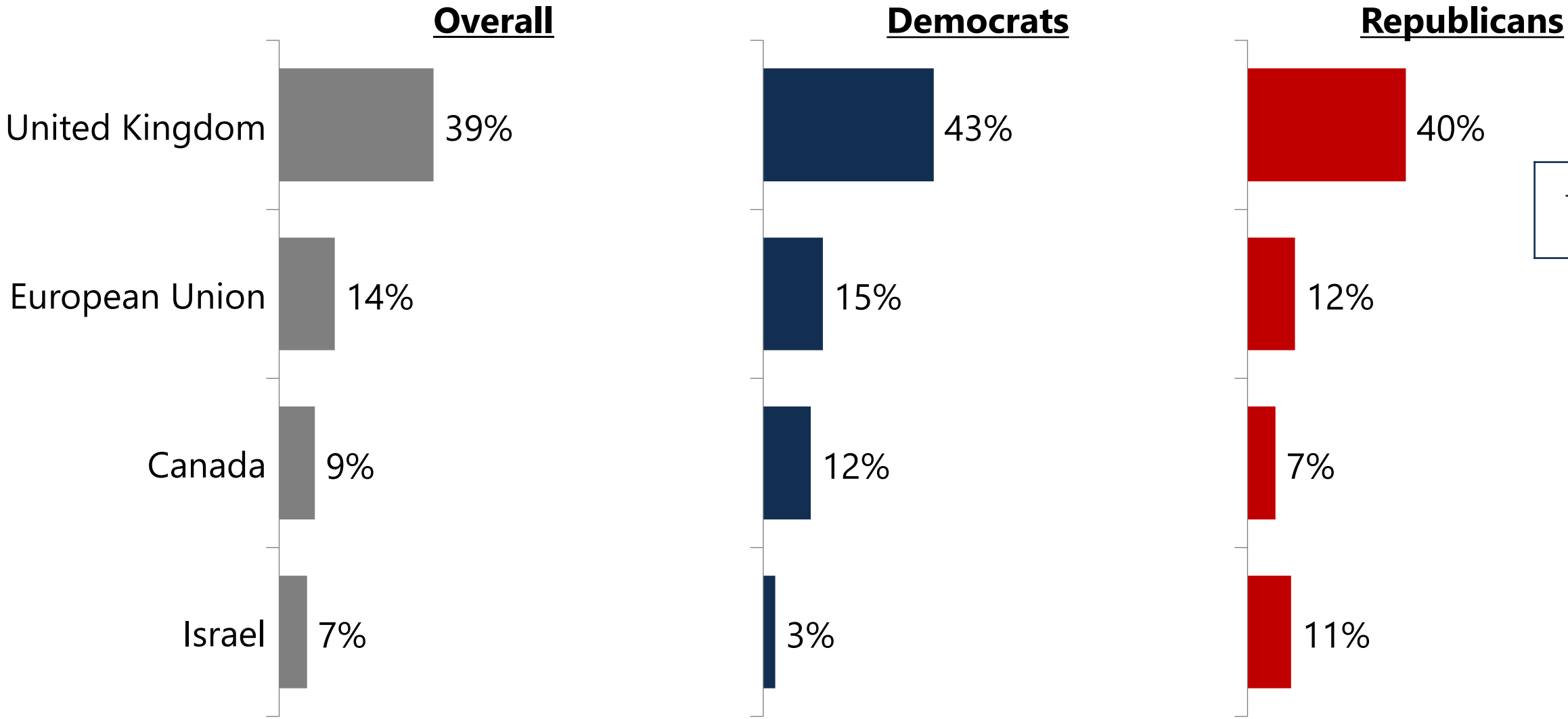

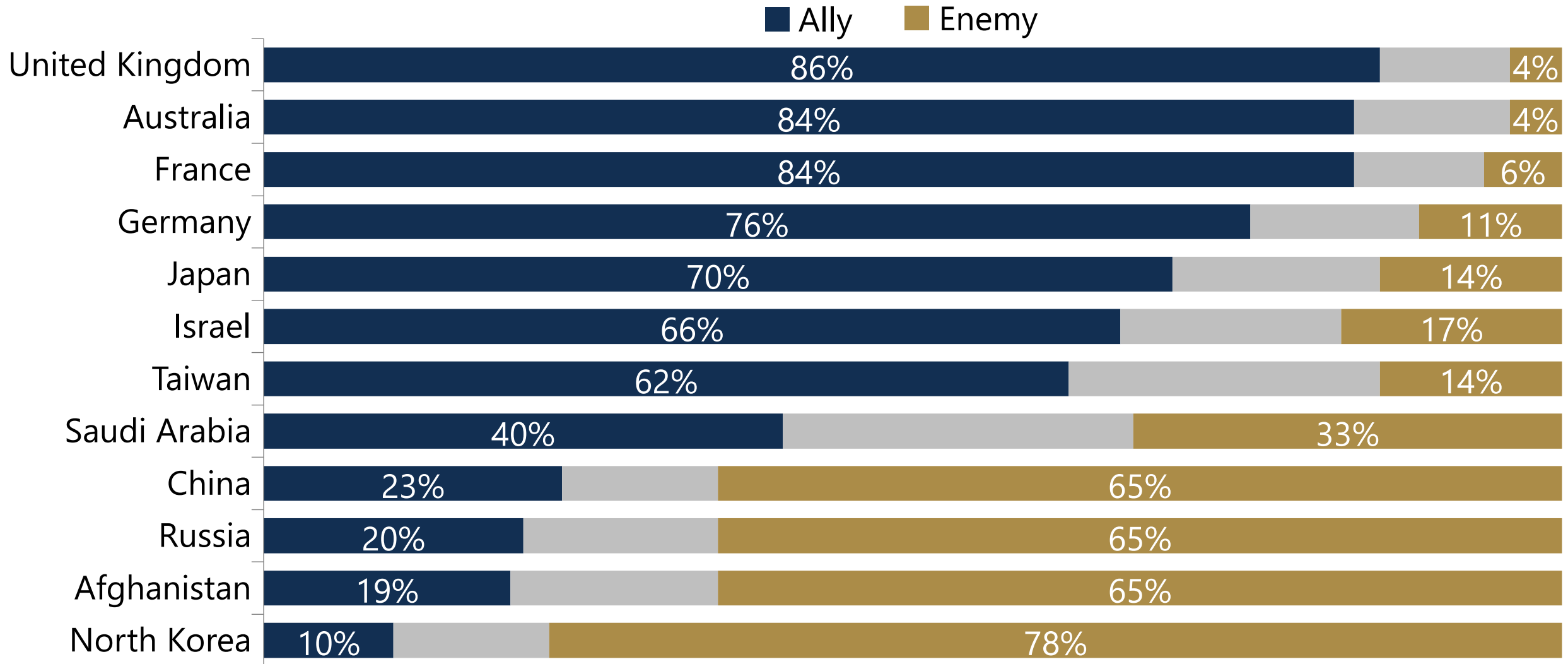

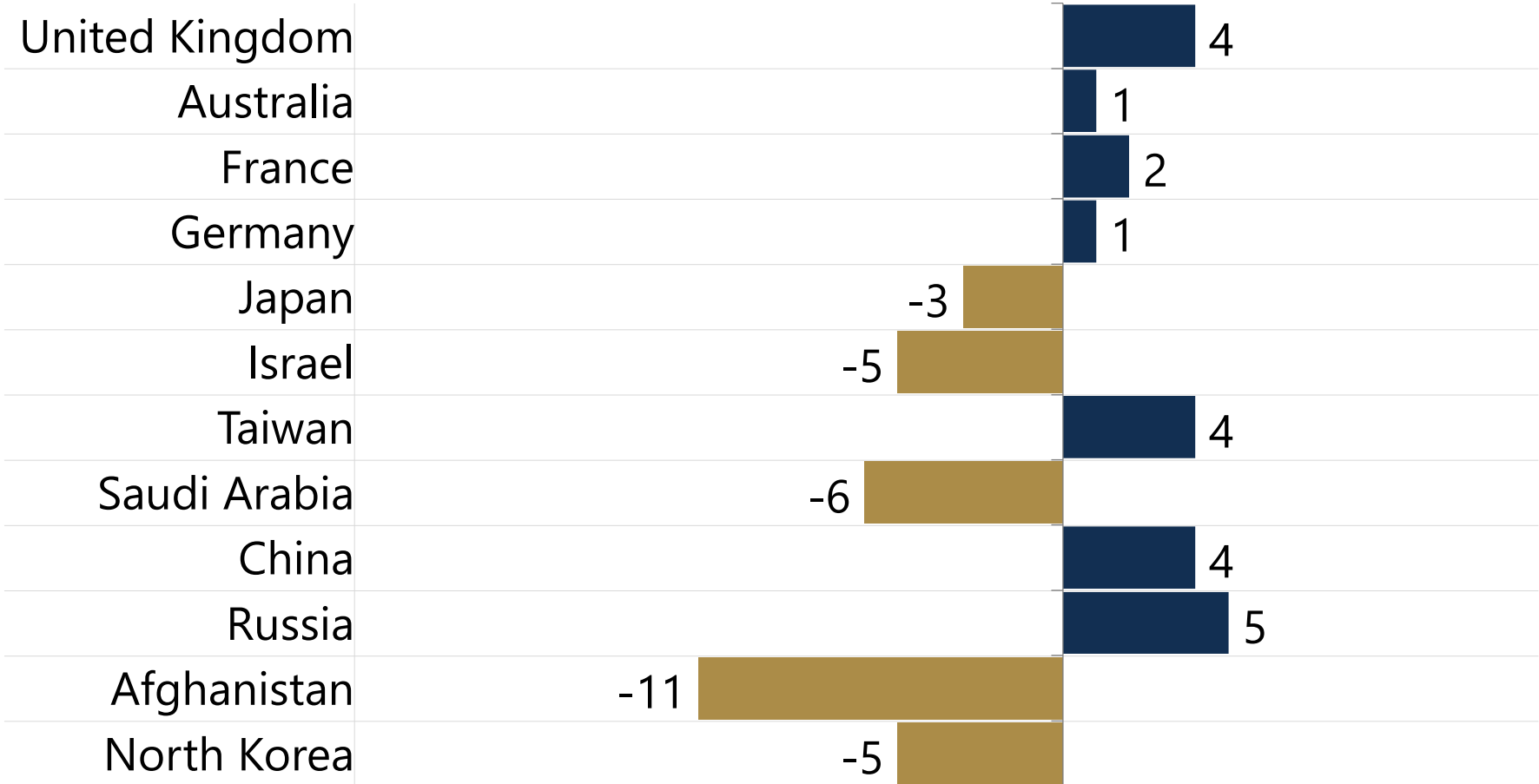

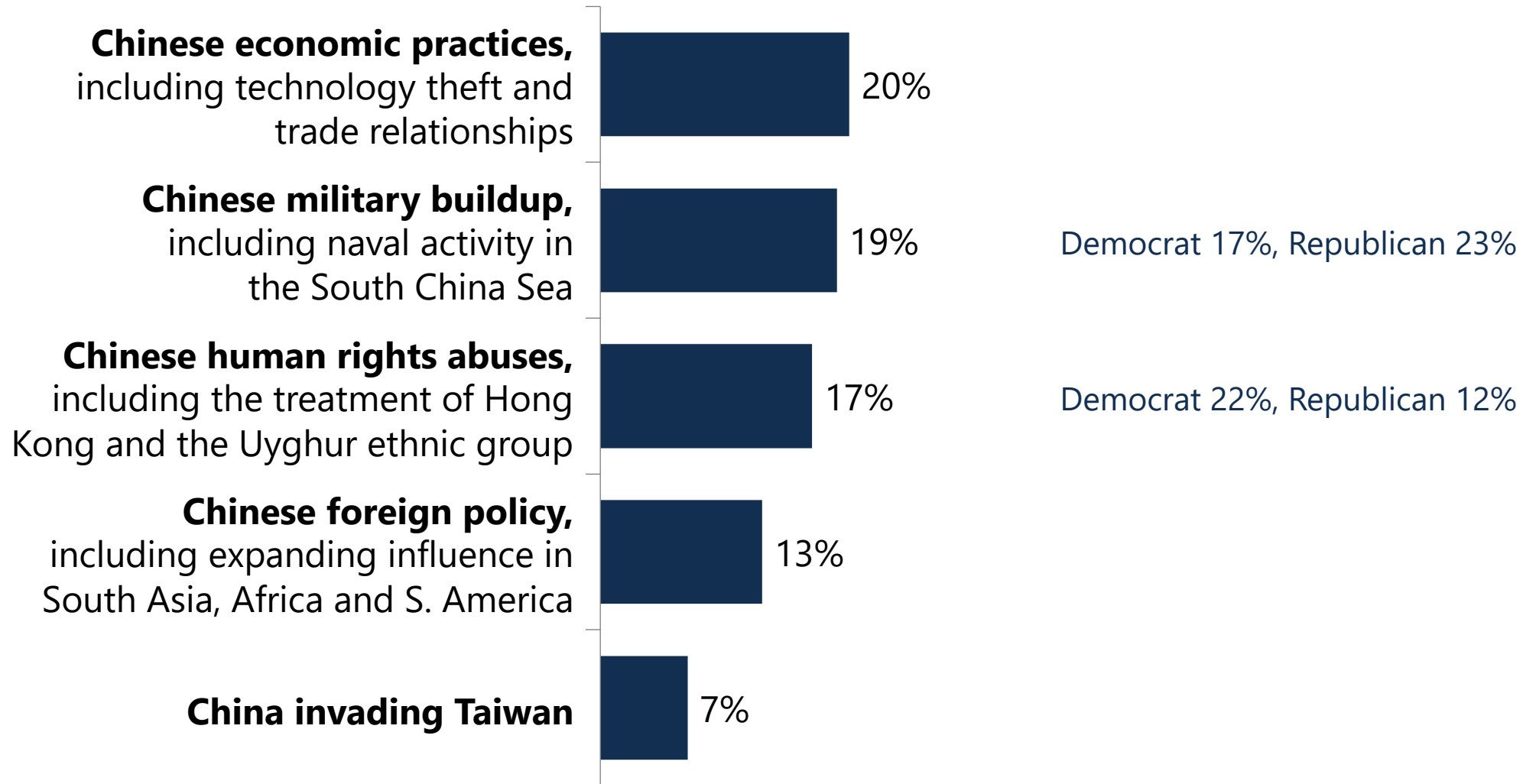

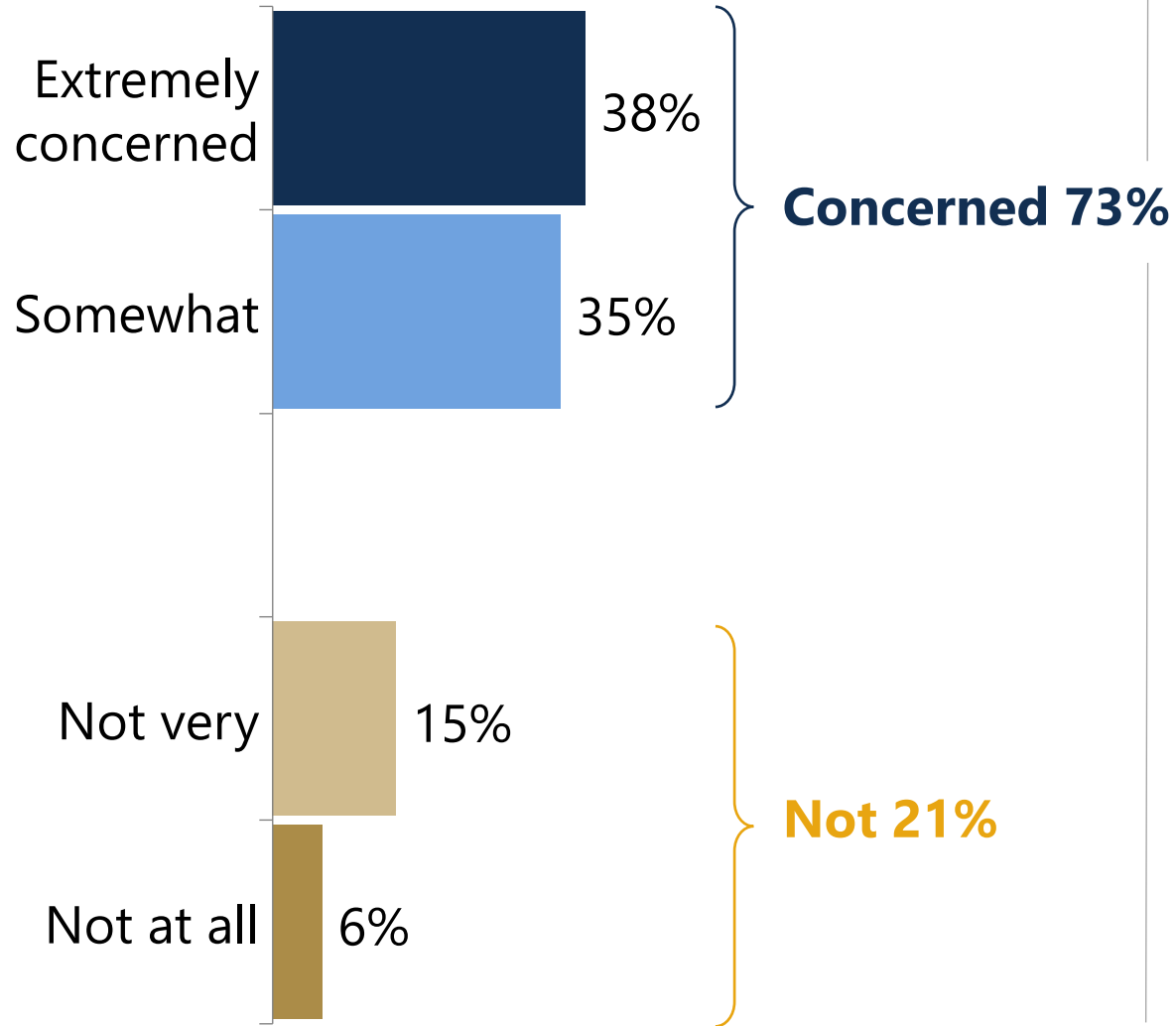

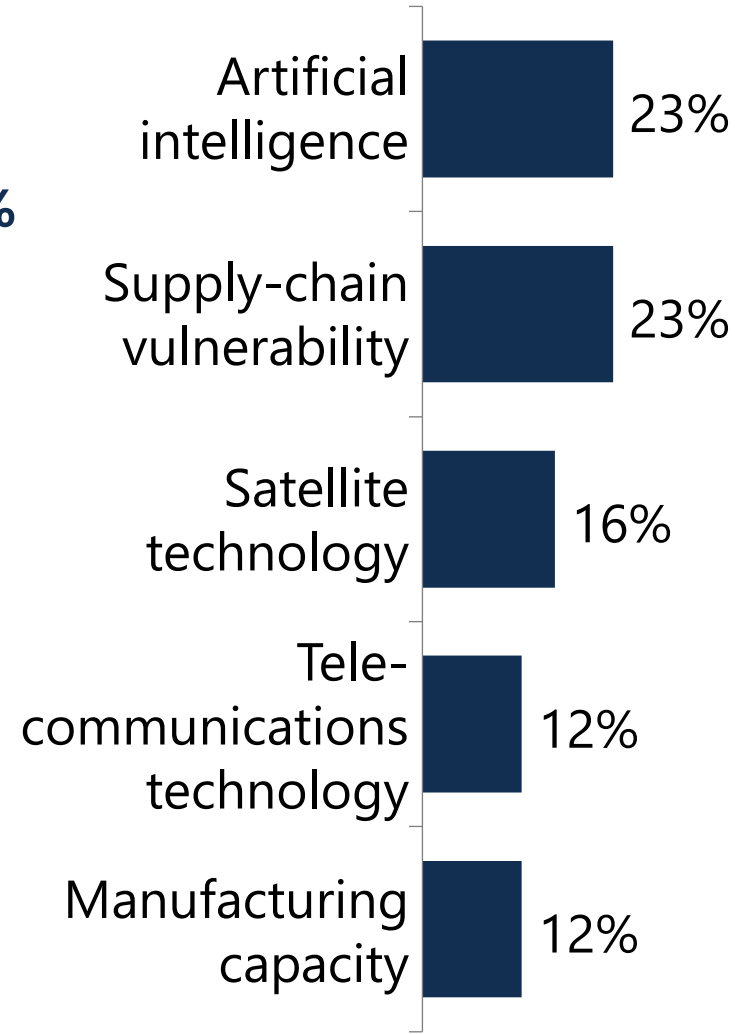

## Most Concerning Tech

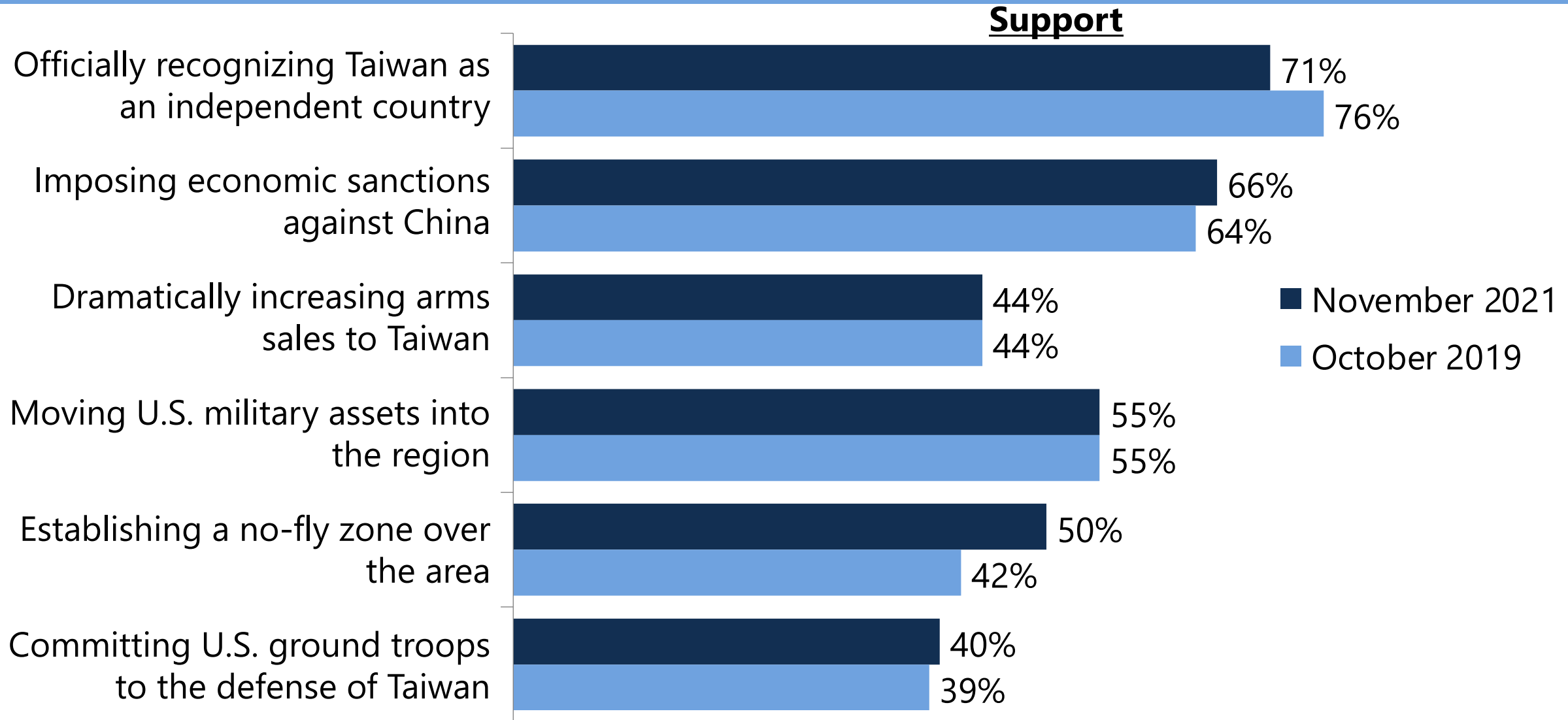

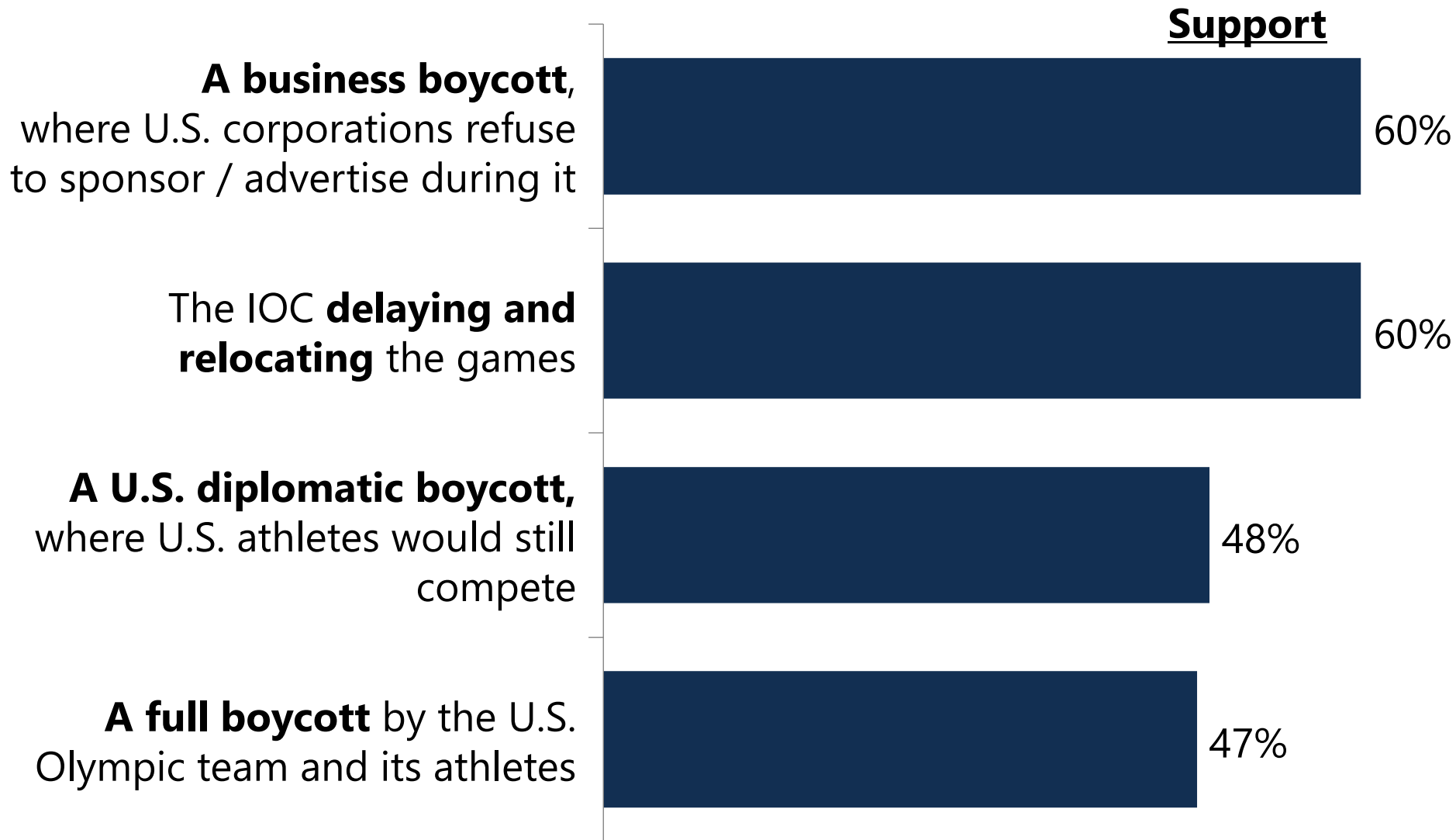

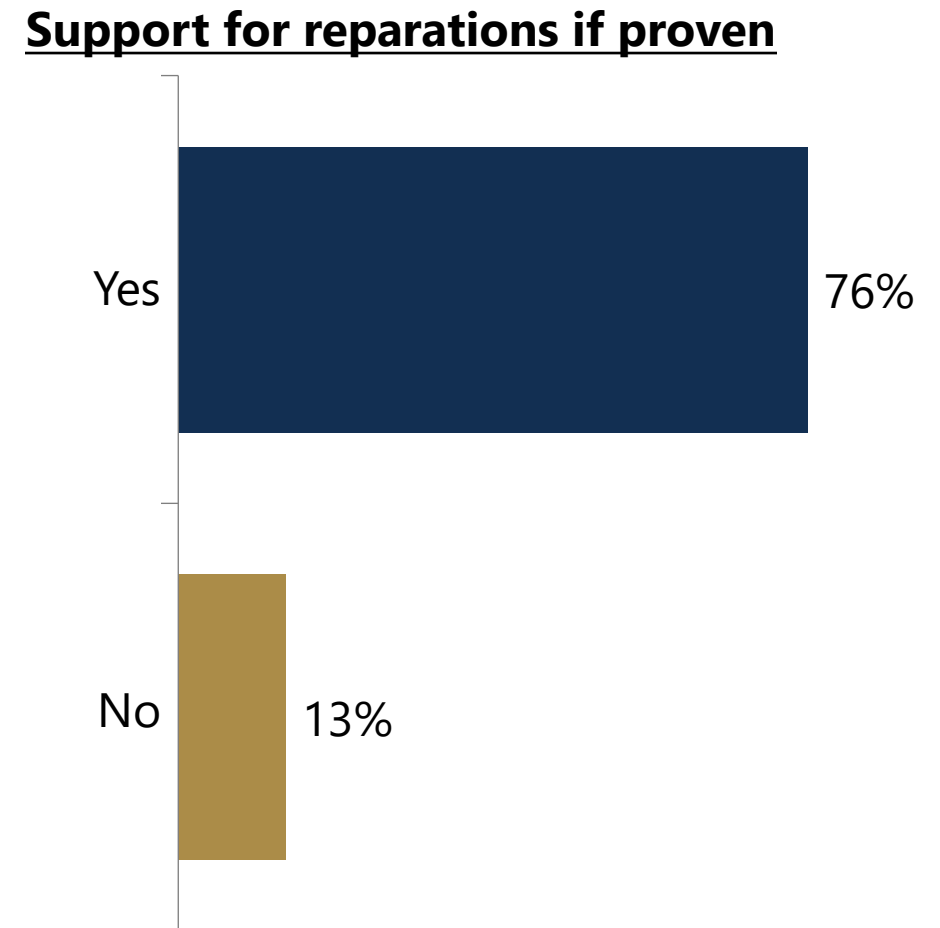
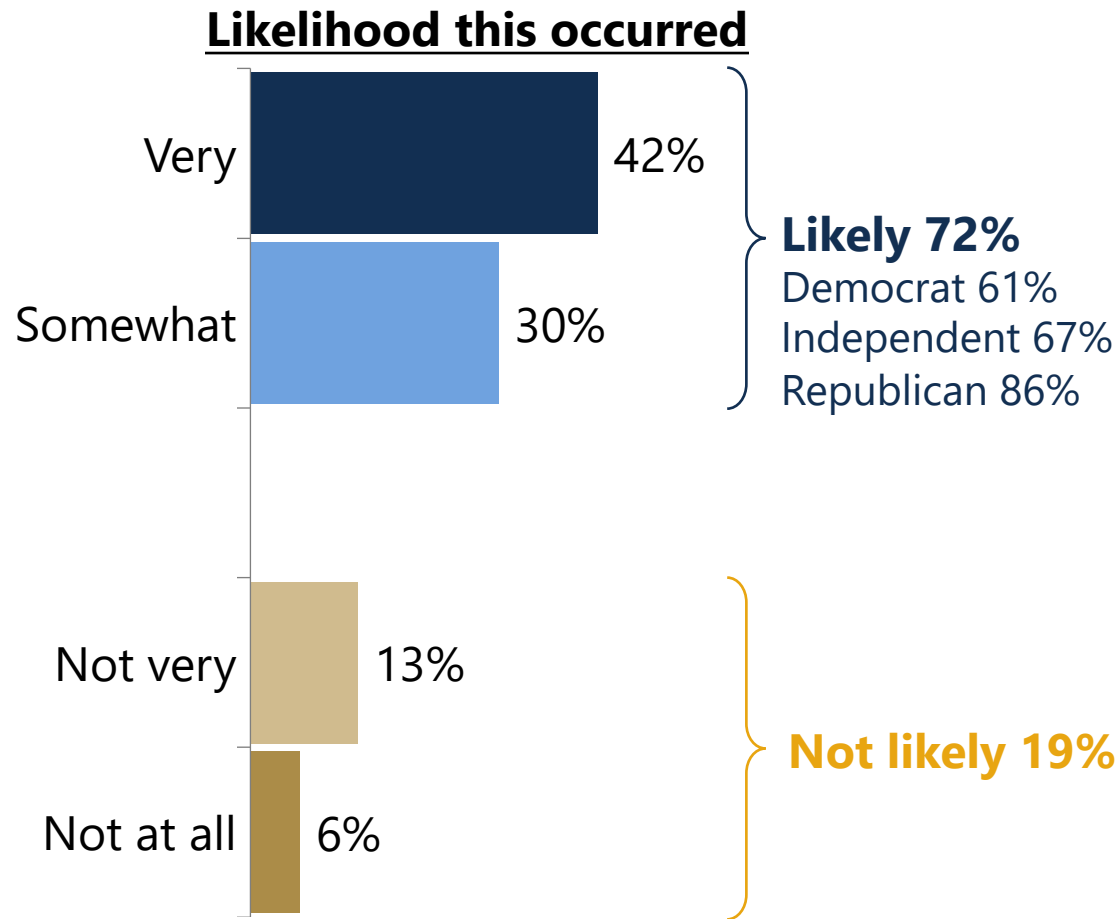

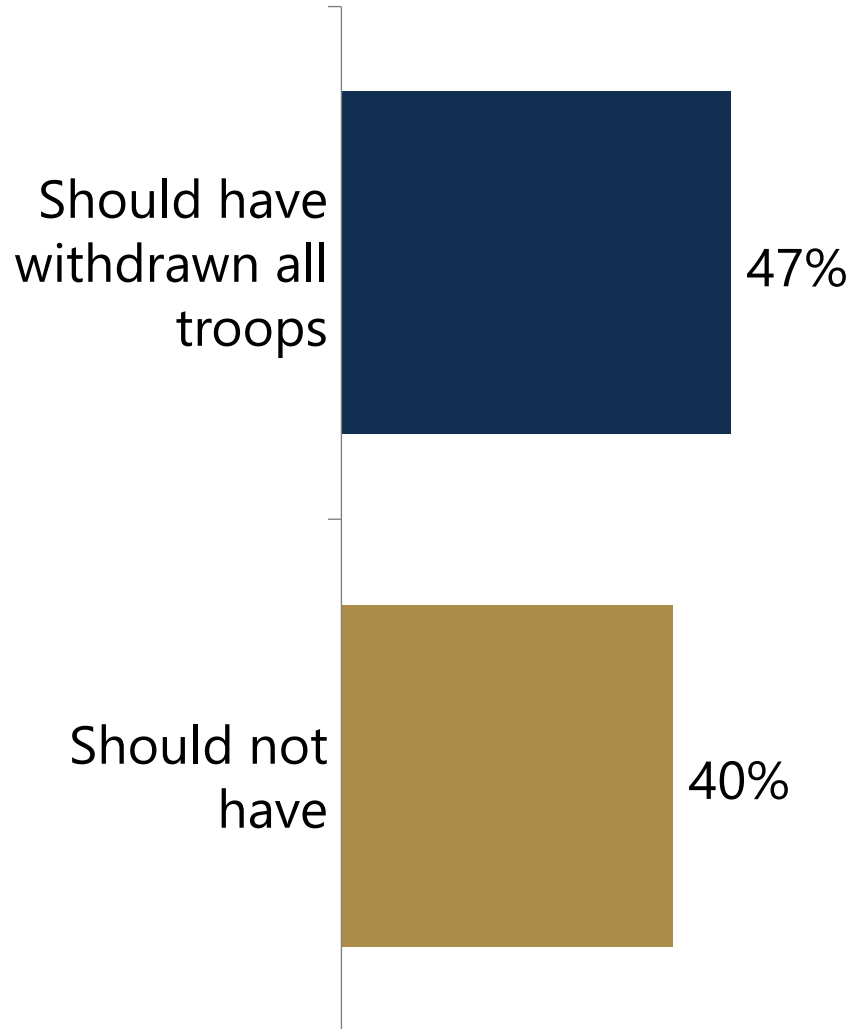

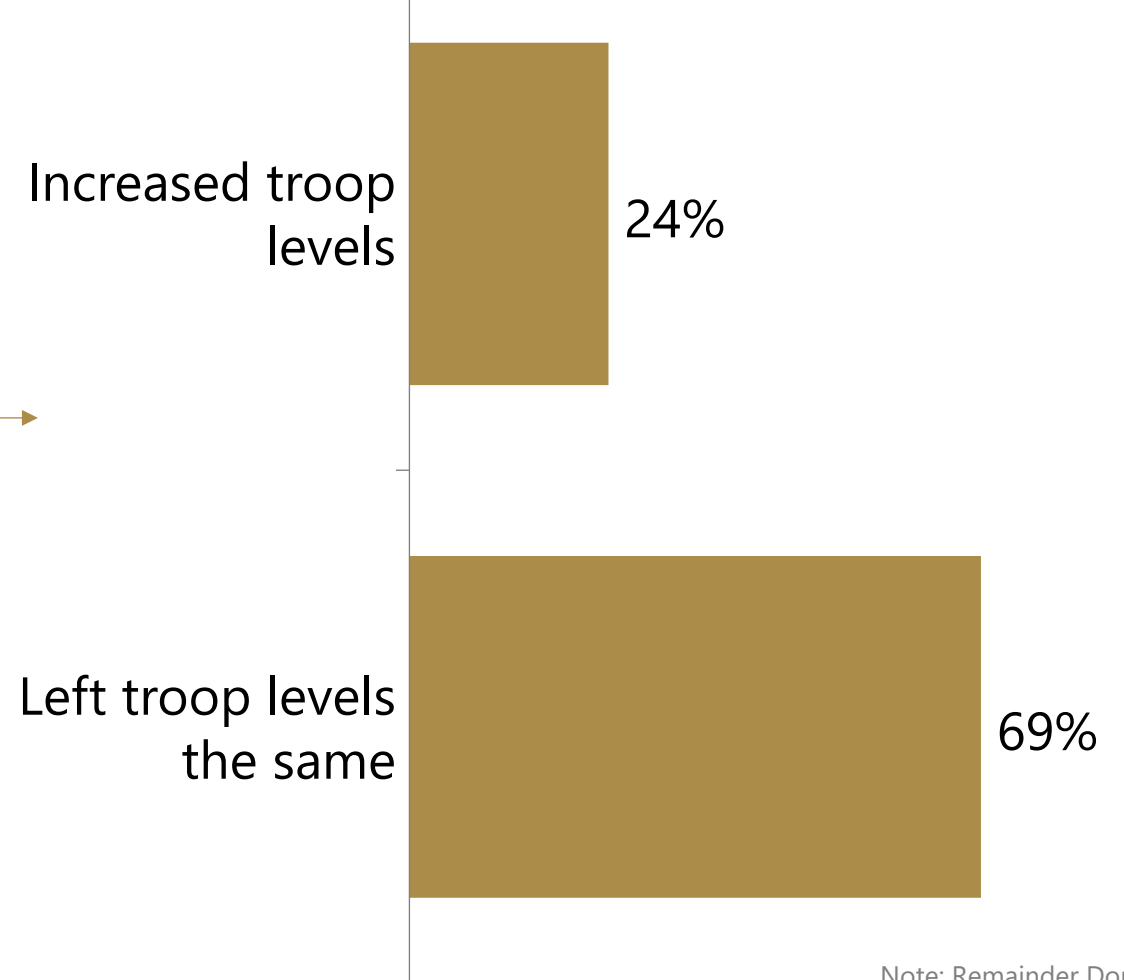

## Rather than Withdrawing, Should the U.S. Have: *(Among those who think troops should not have been withdrawn)*

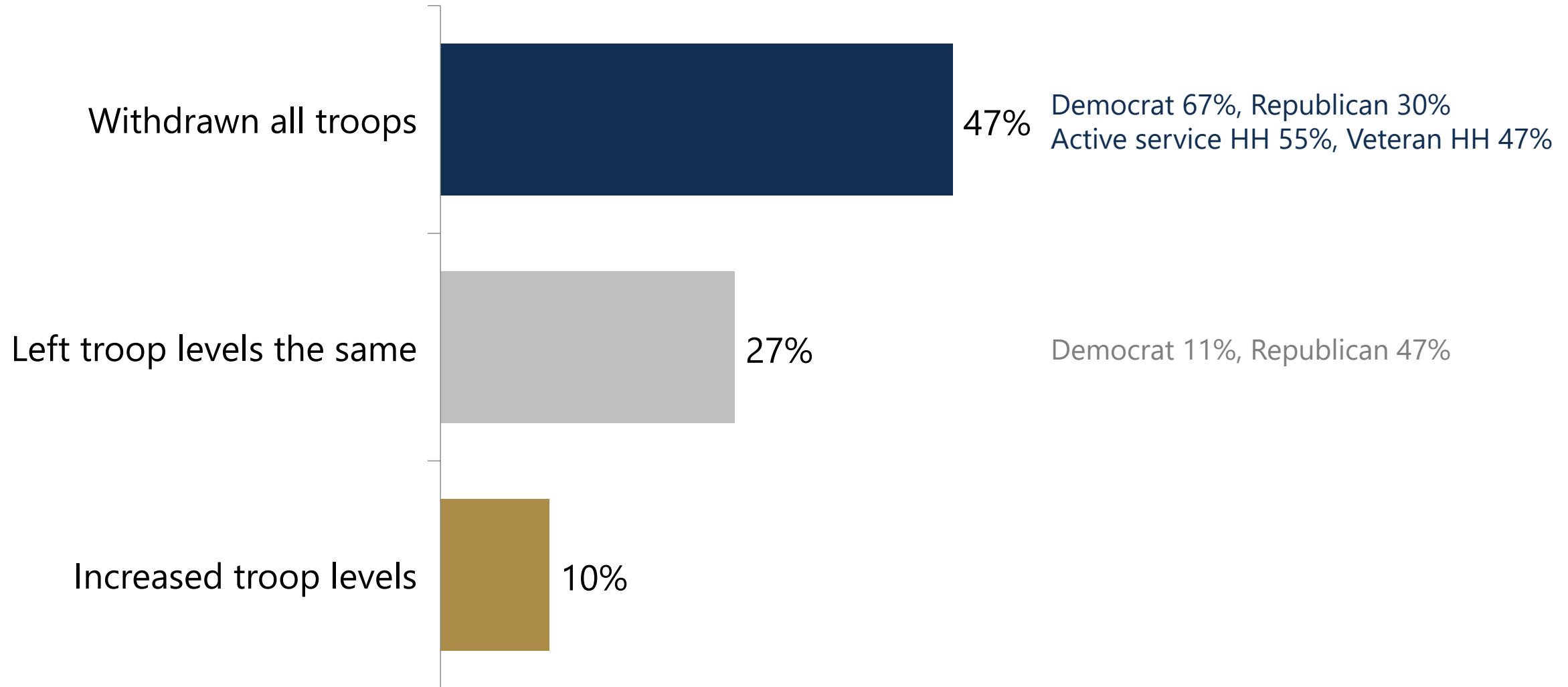

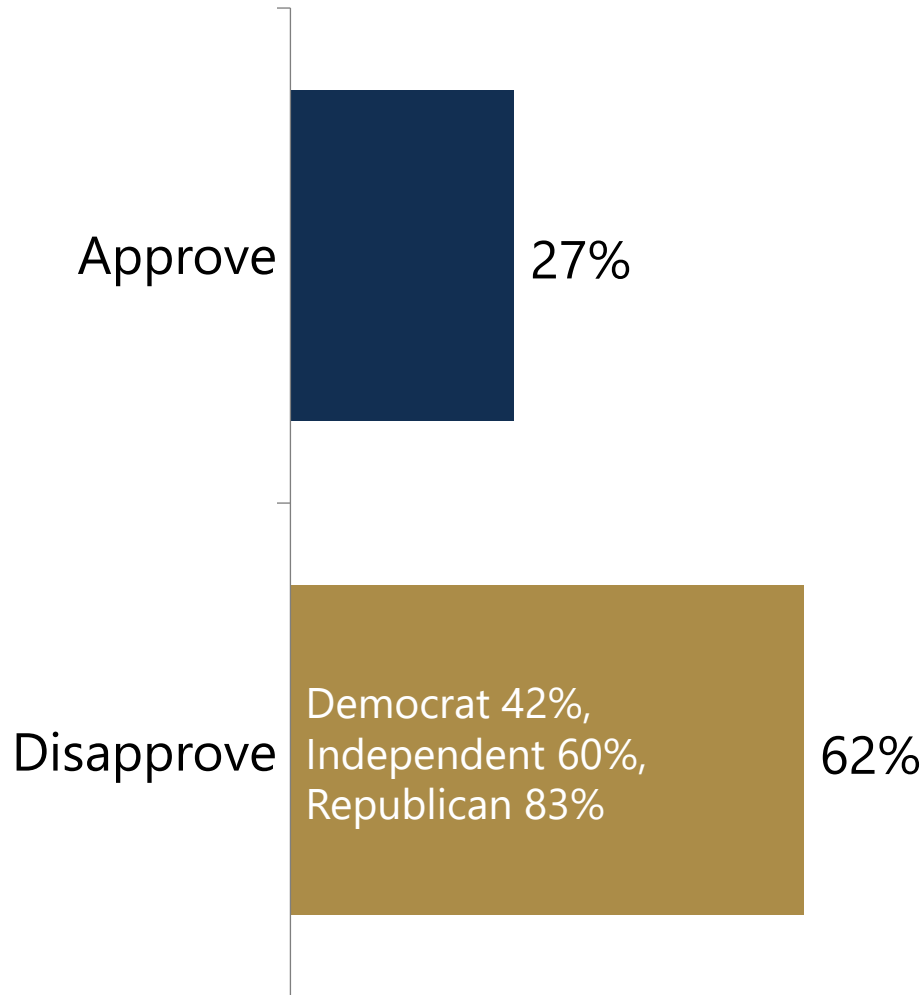

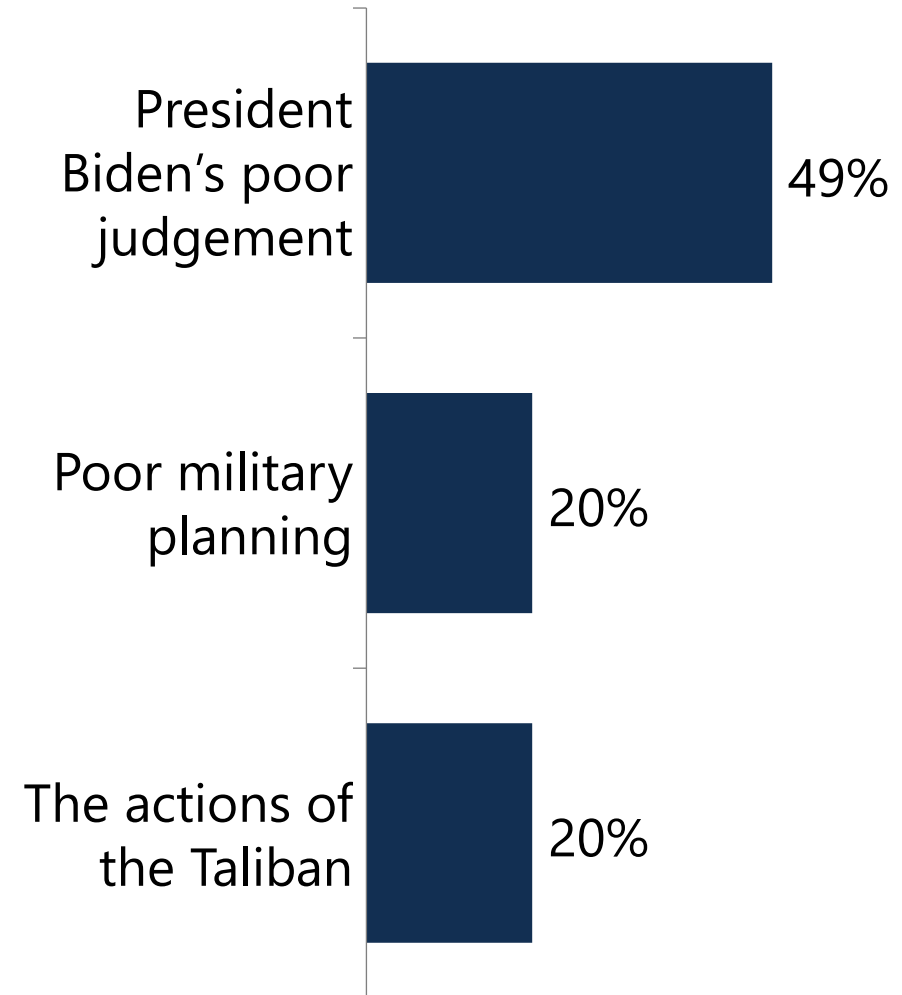

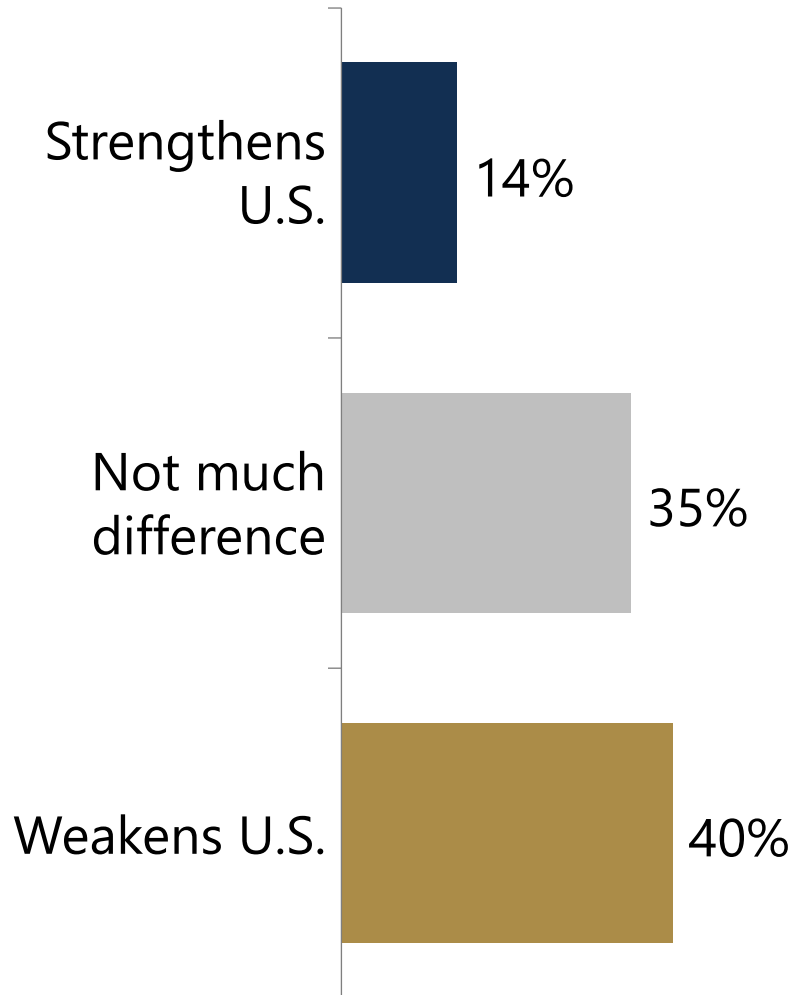

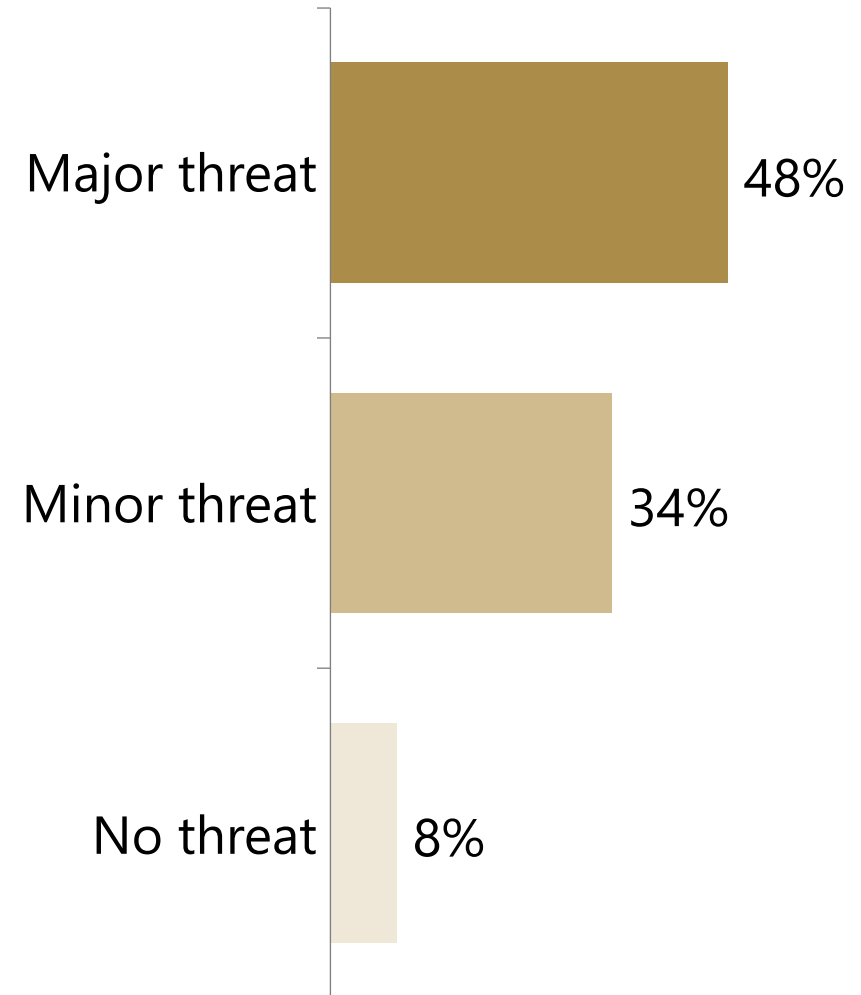

## Threat to US from Taliban Control

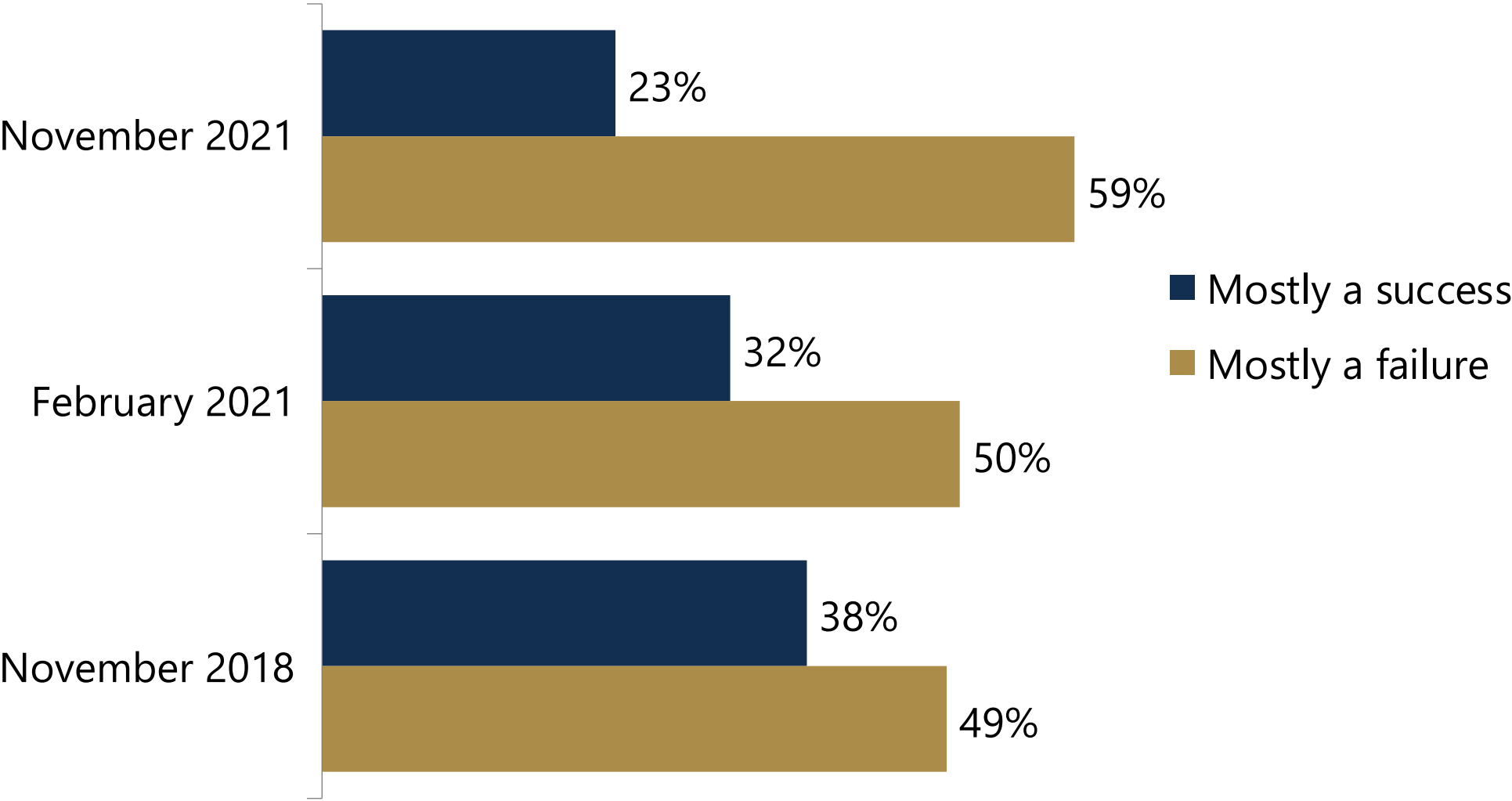

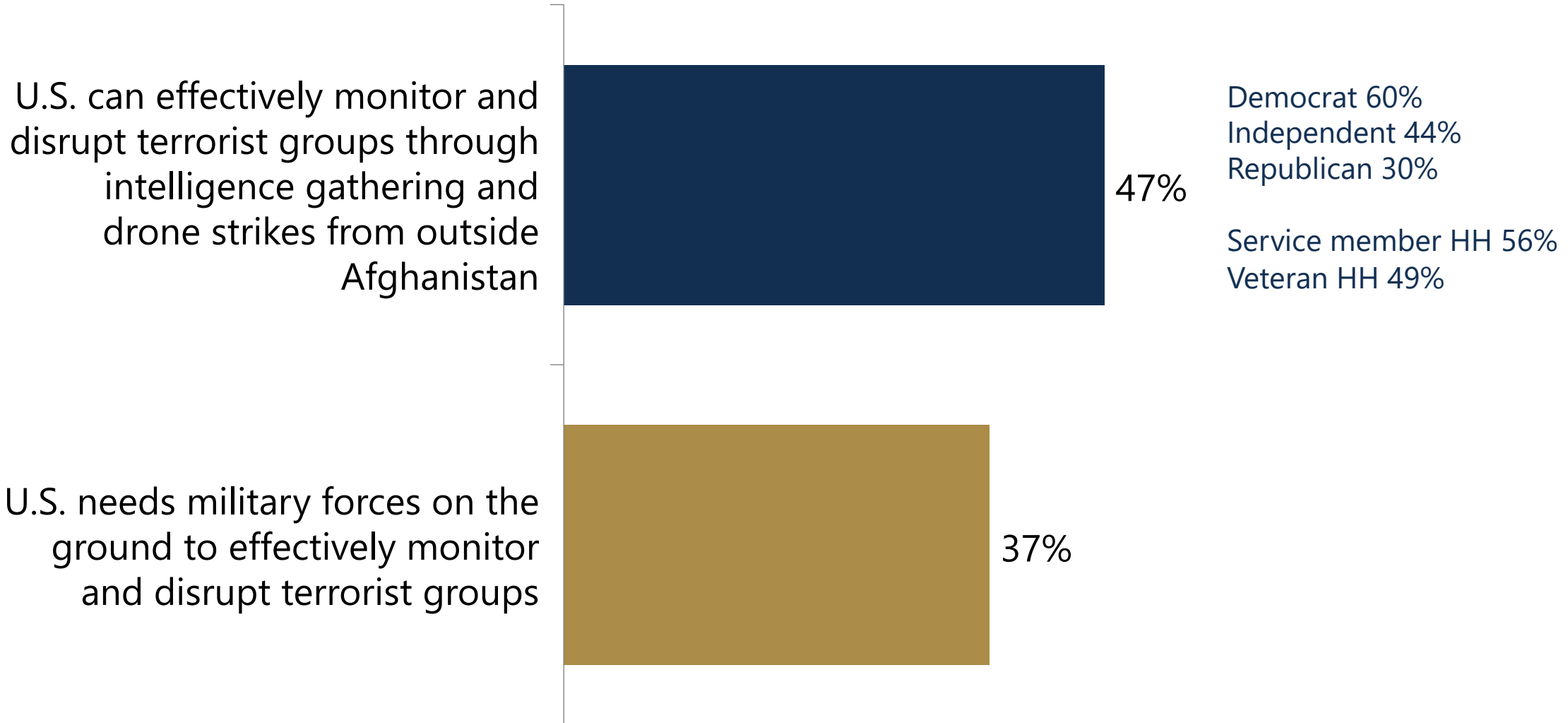

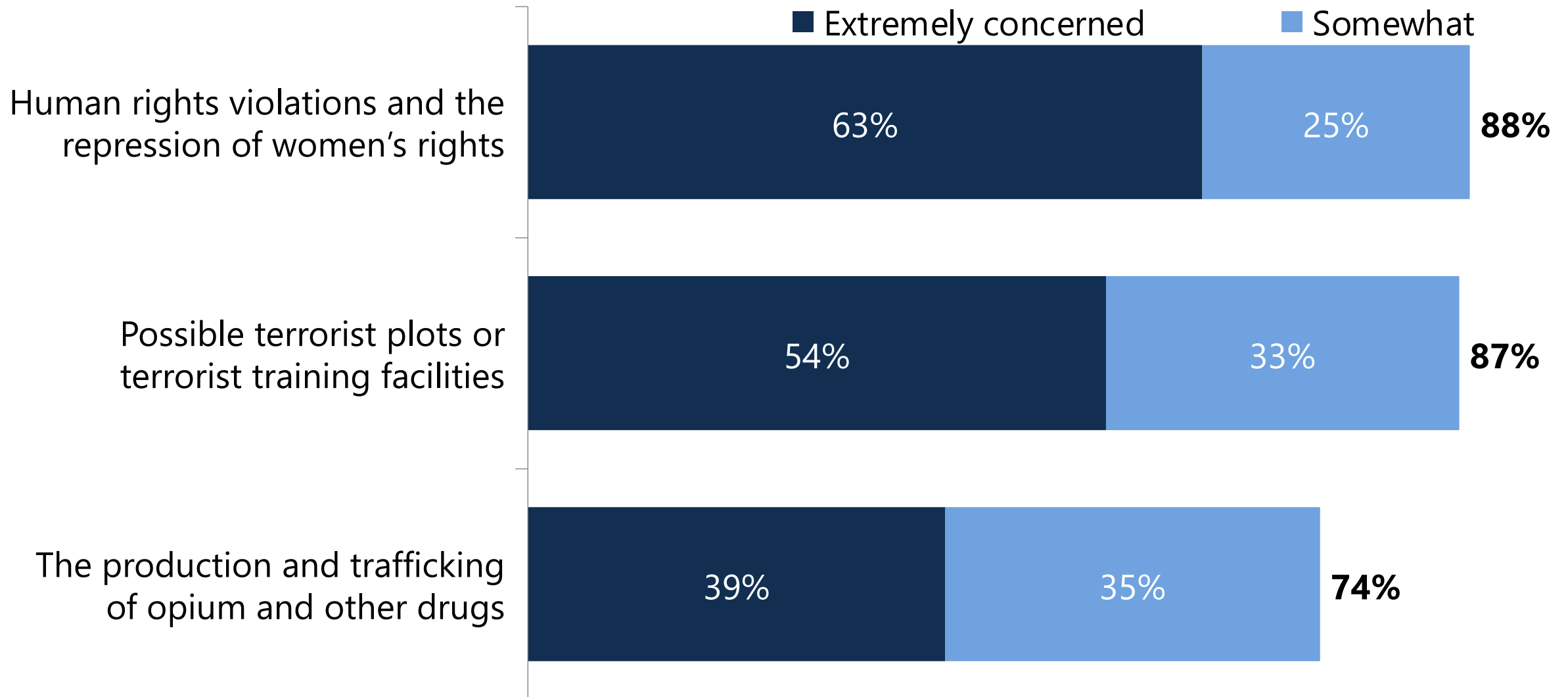

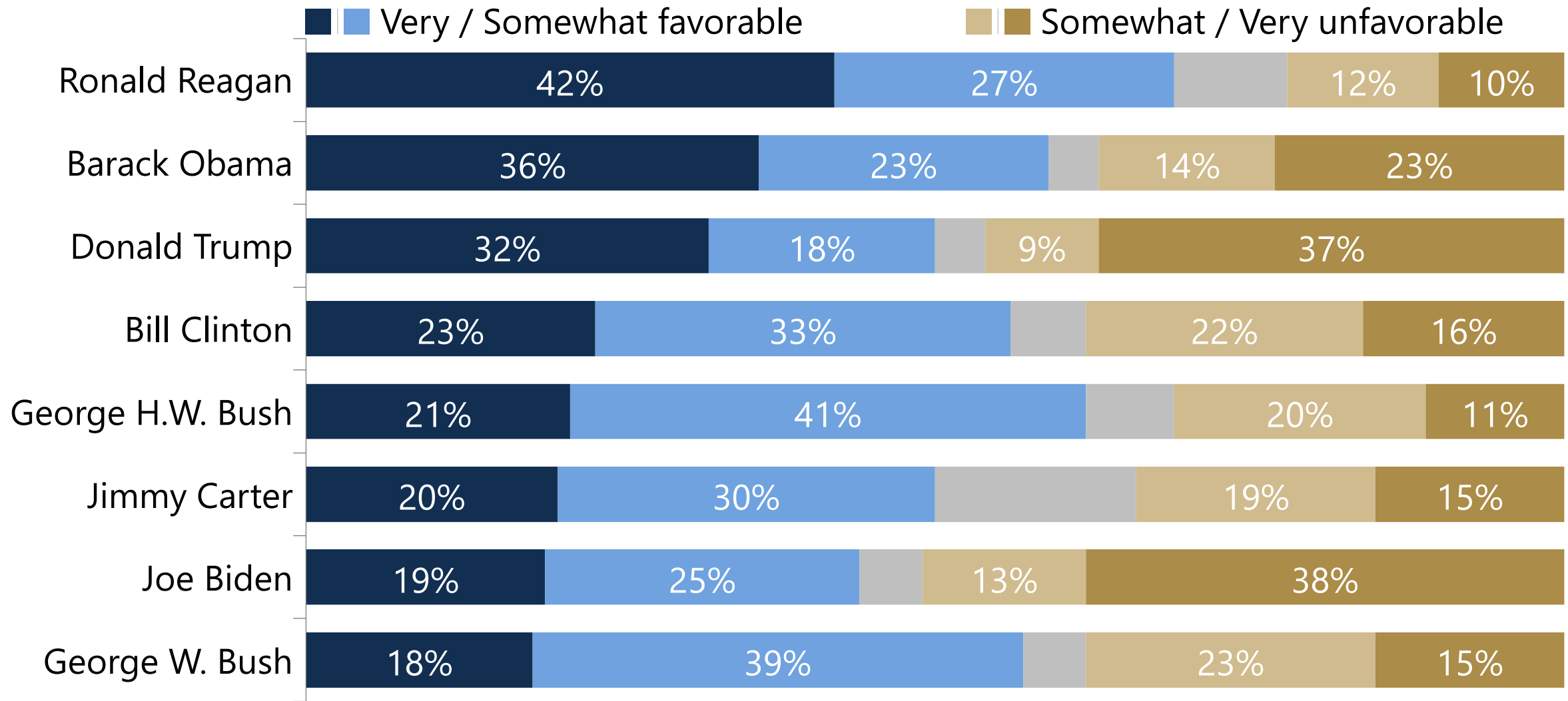
