Dear Colleagues and Friends,

Welcome to the 2025 Age of Reagan Conference. The Ronald Reagan Presidential Foundation and Institute is honored to host you at the Ronald Reagan Presidential Library and Museum for the biennial gathering of scholars dedicated to the serious study of Ronald Reagan's legacy and its implications at home and abroad.

To study President Reagan is to engage with far more than the life of one man or the tenure of a single presidency. It is to encounter the central questions of the late 20th century: How did the Cold War end? What did the triumph of democratic capitalism mean—and for whom? What role did rhetoric, leadership, and grand strategy play in reshaping the global order? And how did the rise of a new form of conservatism remake domestic politics? President Reagan stands at the intersection of these developments not as a passive observer, but as a statesman who both shaped and was shaped by the institutions, ideas, and movements of his time. His presidency provides a vital vantage point for understanding the changing role of the federal government, the realignment of political coalitions, the cultural debates of the 1980s, and the evolving relationship between liberty and government in modern American life. This year's program reflects that broader ambition.

Interest in Ronald Reagan—both in the public imagination and in scholarship—continues to grow. The recent release of *Reagan*, the feature film, has brought his story to a broader audience and renewed debate over his legacy. At the same time, this year's book prize finalists—Jennifer Burns for *Milton Friedman: The Last Conservative*, Aaron Bateman for *Weapons in Space: The Rise and Fall of the Strategic Defense Initiative*, and James Wilson for *America's Cold Warrior: Paul Nitze and National Security from Roosevelt to Reagan*—reflect the expanding scope and depth of research into the Reagan era. The selection of Burns as this year's winner underscores the enduring power of the ideas that shaped Ronald Reagan's presidency and its times.

We are also proud to highlight the other ways the Ronald Reagan Presidential Foundation and Institute supports scholars. Our fellowships provide the opportunity for authors to complete their first book on topics related to American political thought, foreign policy, and the Reagan presidency. We stimulate new research through special-topic working groups, including ongoing initiatives on conservatism and presidential rhetoric. And we remain committed to hosting scholarship that moves the needle—through book talks, seminars, podcasts, and other convenings that bring deeply researched ideas into public view.

Finally, we are thrilled to welcome back Dr. Douglas Brinkley as our keynote speaker. His work on *The Reagan Diaries* helped lay the foundation for a new era of Reagan scholarship, and his conversation will no doubt offer fresh insights into both President Reagan's world and our own. Thank you for being part of this important conversation.

Douglas Brinkley




Douglas Brinkley is the Katherine Tsanoff Brown Chair in Humanities and Professor of History at Rice University, presidential historian for the New-York Historical Society and a contributing editor at *Vanity Fair*. He serves on the Board of Trustee of the National Archives Foundation, the James Madison Council of the Library of Congress, and both the Theodore Roosevelt and Franklin D. Roosevelt Presidential Libraries. *The Chicago Tribune* dubbed him "America's New Past Master". He is the recipient of seven honorary doctorates in American studies.


Brinkley has written/edited three *New York Times* bestselling books on Ronald Reagan: *The Boys of Point du Hoc: Ronald Reagan, D-Day and the U.S. Army 2nd Ranger Battalion* (2005); *The Reagan Diaries* (2007); and *The Notes* (2011). More recently, his two-volume, annotated *Nixon Tapes* (2014-15) won the Arthur S. Link-Warren F. Kuehl Prize. His works include World War II, the Vietnam War, the National Parks system, John

F. Kennedy, Rosa Parks, Gerald R. Ford, Bob Dylan, Hurricane Katrina, Henry Ford and Walter Cronkite which all received critical acclaim. Six of his nonfiction books have been chosen as *New York Times's* "Notable Book of the Year". Brinkley has also won two Grammy Awards in the jazz category for the albums *Presidential Suite* and *Fandango at the Wall*.

He lives in Austin, Texas with his family.




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
AGE OF REAGAN CONFERENCE BOOK PRIZE



Jennifer Burns

Associate Professor of History at Stanford University





Prior to graduate school, Burns worked as a researcher and macroeconomic analyst at Harvard Business School, where she authored cases on antitrust policy, environmental risk management, encryption regulation, and international labor practices.


Professor Burns is the author of the acclaimed biography *Goddess of the Market: Ayn Rand and the American Right* (Oxford University Press 2009). Based on her U.C. Berkeley doctoral dissertation and drawing on exclusive access to Rand's personal papers, *Goddess of the Market* was the first archivally researched book to tackle the life and times of the controversial libertarian novelist and philosopher. Published amid rising public interest in Rand, *Goddess of the Market* was widely reviewed in the national press, and Burns was interviewed on both *The Daily Show with John Stewart* and *The Colbert Report. Goddess of the Market* was named a Best Book of 2009 by *Bloomberg News*, and a Russian translation was published in Moscow in 2020. As she recounted in the book's Note on Sources and a follow up essay in *The Raritan Quarterly*, Burns was the first scholar to document and publicize discrepancies between Rand's unedited letters and journals and their published versions, stirring controversy among Ayn Rand fans and scholars.


Throughout her career, Burns has been committed to sharing her scholarship with the broadest possible audience. In 2005, she became a podcasting pioneer after releasing lectures from her Berkeley course, Introduction to U.S. History from 1865, on iTunes. Among the first American university lectures to be freely shared online - and still one of the rare humanities courses available - the lectures attracted an appreciative worldwide audience, and are now hosted at www.jenniferburns.org. More recently, Burns has been a guest on numerous top ranked podcasts from *Marginal Revolution* to the *Lex Fridman Podcast*.


In 2023, Burns published her second book, *Milton Friedman: The Last Conservative*, which was named a finalist for the 2024 Hayek Prize and the 2025 Age of Reagan Book Prize. Based on a decade of archival research, *Milton Friedman* is both a biography of the influential Nobel Prize winning economist and a broader history of twentieth century economic thought. Among other themes, Burns explores the pivotal and previously overlooked contribution of women economists to Friedman's success, a finding she summarized in a *New York Times* op-ed and further analyzed in articles for *History of Political Economy* and *The Journal of Economic Perspectives*.

Burns' current research interests center on the history of economic thought, the origins of the administrative state, and the future of liberalism in a populist age. In recent articles for *The New York Times* and *The Wall Street Journal*, she has written about the impact of inflation on electoral politics, the ideas behind Trump's tariff policies, and the legacies of Ronald Reagan and William F. Buckley, Jr. Professor Burns is also active in the national movement to revitalize civic education, serving as a Charter Member of the Alliance for Civics in the Academy. She is a faculty affiliate of the Stanford Civics Initiative, teaches in Stanford's first year required course on citizenship, and serves on the Stanford Faculty Senate.

Burns enjoys teaching a range of courses on American intellectual and political history, the history of capitalism, and historical research and writing. She has advised over twenty graduate and undergraduate theses across a broad range of topics in U.S. history. Burns is a member of the advisory board of the Niskanen Center in Washington, D.C., a member of the editorial board of the *Journal of Policy History*, and in 2025 will be inducted into the American Academy of Sciences and Letters.


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
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Dr. Anthony Eames

Anthony Eames is the Director of Scholarly Initiatives at the Ronald Reagan Presidential Foundation and Institute, where he oversees the development of academic alliances and is responsible for fellowships and programs to support scholarship on the Reagan presidency, legacy, and era. He holds a Ph.D. in history from Georgetown University and an M.A. jointly conferred from King's College London and Georgetown University. He is the author of *A Voice*

In Their Own Destiny: Reagan, Thatcher, and Public Diplomacy in the Nuclear 1980s (UMass) and co-author, with John Baylis, of Sharing Nuclear Secrets: Trust, Mistrust, and Ambiguity in Anglo-American Nuclear Relations, 1939-Present (Oxford). He has spoken and published widely on nuclear and national security issues in journals and other outlets, including for The Journal of Military History, Technology & Culture, and War on the Rocks. In addition to his work at the Institute, Anthony teaches at George Washington University's Elliott School of International Affairs.

Henry R. Nau is Professor Emeritus of Political Science and International Affairs at George Washington University. He holds a B.S. degree in Economics, Politics and Science from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from The Johns Hopkins University School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS). His books include, among others, *Conservative Internationalism: Armed Diplomacy Under Jefferson, Polk, Truman, and Reagan*

From 1982 to 1989, Mr. Ryan served on the White House Staff, and was Assistant to the President of the United States, overseeing Presidential Appointments and Scheduling, where he was involved in long-range strategic planning and communications strategy for the White House. He also served as Director of the White House Private Sector Initiatives program where he was the President's representative to the American and international business communities.

Mr. Ryan currently serves as chairman of the White House Endowment and Acquisition Trust and is a member of the board of the National Geographic Society, the University of Southern California, and is a member of the Smithsonian Institution's Strategy, Innovation, and Technology Committee.

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
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
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
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
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
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Mr. David Trulio

impact. Among these are the Reagan National Defense Forum and the Reagan National Economic Forum.

Previously, Mr. Trulio was Managing Editor, Head of Strategy and Editorial Operations, at FOX News Digital. Earlier, he had extensive experience as a leader in both the U.S. government and defense sector.

At the Export-Import Bank of the United States, Mr. Trulio served as Counselor to the Chairman and Senior Vice President for the Program on China and Transformational Exports. At the Department of Defense, he was Senior Advisor and Chief of Staff to the Under Secretary of Defense for Policy, where his responsibilities included serving as Executive Director of the Defense Policy Board, and he performed the duties of Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for International Security Affairs.
