## Political Violence is an Attack on America's Founding Principles

The increasing acts of political violence in the United States, most recently the political assassinations of Turning Point USA founder and president Charlie Kirk and Minnesota House of Representatives Speaker Emerita Melissa Hortman, are shocking examples of the dangers posed by political extremism and violence. These acts are not random - they are driven by hatred and designed to silence voices and sow fear. They are an attack not only on individuals, but on America's civic culture itself.

As President Reagan reminded us: "Democrats and Republicans alike must be resolute in disassociating ourselves from any group or individual...whose arguments are supported only by intimidation or threats of violence. We must, and will, continue our unified rejection of such elements of hate in our political life, for while there are many issues which divide us, it is fundamental principles such as this which will always draw us together."

During his presidency, Ronald Reagan showed us how to resist extremism, reminding us that democratic self-government is "never more than one generation away from extinction," and that the most meaningful words in the Constitution are "We the People". And while he fought to advance conservative principles, he was committed above all to preserving the system the Framers designed — a government created to protect individual liberties and maintain unity in the face of disagreement. Time and time again, President Reagan carved out space for independent judgment, dialogue and civic friendship across political differences.

To promote these principles in public life, the Ronald Reagan Center on Civility and Democracy (CCD) launched our Informed Patriotism Series which reminds Americans of the common bonds that unite us as one people. This week, we welcomed Supreme Court Justice Amy Coney Barrett to the Reagan Library where she gave an eloquent defense of civility as a core American principle, watch her inspiring words [here](#).

# The Words That Hold Us Together

History reminds us of an essential fact of human nature: people have always faced division. But this need not preclude the possibility of national and political unity. The genius of the American Founding was to build a country around a new vision of human equality and dignity – first in speech, then gradually in reality. In my upcoming documentary, “The American Revolution,” 10 years in the making, my co-creators and I attempt to tell this story in all its heroic and complex glory.

The Revolutionary period was one of fierce division. Towns, regions and even families were split between Patriots and Loyalists. And such quarrels were not unique to this period. Consider the Civil or Vietnam wars. There has always been conflict. But even amidst these trials, the words and spirit of the Declaration of Independence have always united us.

It was this spirit – genuinely new in human history – that the Revolution first introduced. We’re the only country held together not by a common language, religion or geography, but by words. And to these words we must return.

*We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.*

When we study these words, we see the newness they represent and are called to reinvest in those things we share in common. The founders asked us to be more than subjects, to be citizens with both rights and responsibilities. A subject is passive; a citizen is active.
